FLORIDA CHAPTER CELEBRATES 50 YEARS OF FRIENDSHIP

THAT is what the sign said outside the Tau Alpha chapter house at the University of Florida. It was just the beginning of what proved to be an "emotional explosion" which lasted for the duration of the golden anniversary weekend of Tau Alpha, February 21 and 22.

Five hundred alumni, undergraduate brothers and pledges, national officers, and wives helped Tau Alpha celebrate what Sidney Suntag described as, "the finest, and most impressive TEP function that I, in my almost 30 years of service to TEP as Executive Secretary, have ever attended."

The weekend began with a dinner, reception, and reunion at the TEP house Friday night. The festivities continued Saturday with a class reunion breakfast in the morning and the famous TEP Las Vegas style casino day that afternoon.

The 50th anniversary was climaxed Saturday evening with a gala banquet affair at the Gainesville Hilton.

At the banquet, Brother Bill Edel-

stein, TA 3, who represented Tau Alpha's charter members, retold TEP's beginning story of the 1920's at the University of Florida.

Sam Hyman, MU 4, Tau Alpha's installing officer joined Brother Bill in recalling those early days when TEP at the University of Florida was only a dream.

They were followed by representatives of each decade who retold TEP stories that highlighted their undergraduate experiences.

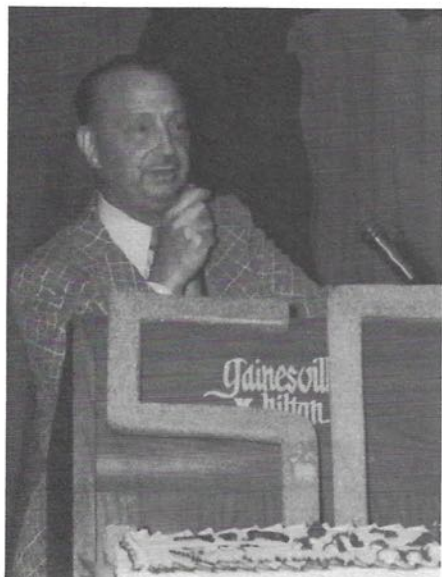

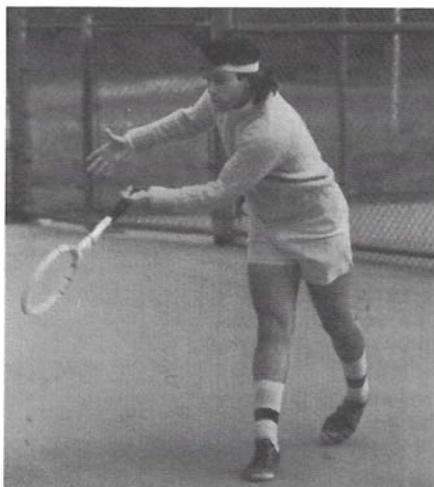

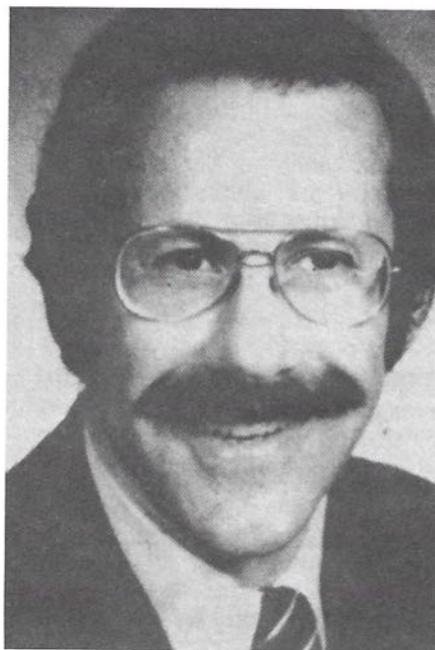

Epsilon Psi Chapter was finished. The seven brothers—Barry Porter, Moe Silberzweig, Barry Morris, Jay Shatswell, Dan Bogan, Charles M. C. Zipser, and Lester Tarmy—refused to accept defeat and decided to either make it or break it.

These men had nothing to offer but true brotherhood, and fraternity. These four men—Mark Lines, Brian Garnett, Jim Humphries, and Glenn Linder—were convinced that fraternity was more than just a house. They pledged and were inducted. The Renaissance of Epsilon Psi Chapter had begun.

In the fall of 1974, the eight remaining brothers worked at the efficiency of 20. The chapter pledged and inducted 5 new brothers, the largest pledge class of the five campus fraternities. Financially, we are starting to become more stable.

Our present stature on campus includes vice-president and treasurer of student government, the general manager and program director of the campus radio station, the advertising editor of the school newspaper, as well as the highest cumulative average of any fraternity on campus.

We are now entering the spring pledge program during which time the freshmen pledge. Following a highly successful pledge program, our pledge class stands at 14!

We are presently searching for a house for next year. This summer for the first time in many years, Epsilon Psi will be represented at national convention. It finally seems that the brothers have it together and the only direction is up. See you at the convention in August.

Delta Chapter, Cornell

IF there was an award for diversity among TEPs, Delta Chapter at Cornell University, 1975, would have to be a leading contender. The brothers of TEP's fourth-oldest chapter—15 new members will make a total of 54 strong—maintained an astounding House "cume" of nearly 3.40, almost certainly the highest of any Cornell fraternity, last term. But they still found time to assume positions of leadership in a wide variety of on and off-campus activities.

The Cornell Engineer, a leading publication in its field, has for example become almost a TEP "preserve": Bernie Newman is heading into his second full year as Editor-in-Chief, Bob Lee is completing a highly successful year as Business Manager, and Al Gabelman and Pledge Bob Spivack hold important positions on the Engineer staff. Among other Delta Chapter TEPs, Doug Kay and Mark Ruderman work for radio station WVBR, and Mike Livingston and Pledge Jeff Wahba for *The Cornell Daily Sun*. Howie Pripas and Mitch Cohen are active in the Student Government of the School of Industrial and Labor Relations at Cornell, and Art Steinberg has been elected to the University Senate. And, in addition, sophomore Harry Gittelson speculates in rare coins and even runs his own "HMG Coins" operation.

All these individual achievements, of course, would be meaningless if not for the many fraternal activities in which Cornell TEPs participate together. These are the activities, after all, that hold a house together. But it's in just these activities that Delta Chapter, especially as we've moved into the Spring term, has been excelling.

The social schedule has gotten off to a fast start with a Co-Ed Bowling Night, and a tobogganing night followed by a get-together at the house. TEPs have taken to playing some aggressive but friendly ice hockey in the late hours almost every Saturday night this Spring at Cornell's Lyanah Rink. And the Deltans haven't forgotten their community obligations, either. Late last term, they decisively gave the lie to cynics who accuse fraternity men of enjoying such pranks as crowding onto mattresses and ignoring social responsibilities—precisely by piling themselves on a mattress in a successful effort to raise money for local charities!! As Cornell's Barton Hall teemed with hockey fans sleeping over for season's tickets, TEPs joined members of one other fraternity and a Cornell sorority to pile 74 students on a double mattress (!), breaking by 8 the

old official world's record and winning, for local programs, money that had been pledged if the effort succeeded. As the picture shows, the TEPs, if they had to momentarily struggle for breath, had quite a time of it even as they helped out the Ithaca, New York, community.

All in all, then, Delta Chapter has good reason to look ahead with optimism. As Bob Lee '76 replaced Rich Dinerstein as house Chancellor at a well-attended and successful Parent's Weekend banquet—joining Vice Chancellor Howie Pripas '76, Bursar Don Spector '76, and Scribe Mike Livingston '77 as officers—he took over a house of outstanding individuals, but moreover, a house working together as worthy representatives of a proud 60-year old TEP chapter.

Epsilon Mu (Lehman College)

THE Epsilon Mu Chapter of Lehman College is the only remaining National fraternity in the Bronx, New York. When asked by the Dean of Students why TEP is still around, the reply was, "We have the will to survive." Aside from the need to, "Live in the light of friendship" and "Walk in the path of chivalry," there is also a need for, "Serving for the love of service." Service is the key to our future survival by maintaining our well established school and community relations with our new neighbors in our new house.

On campus, we volunteer free time during registration to help our fellow students through the tedious procedure. Fifteen brothers are Senators of the Student Government, four of whom are on the Executive Board, and a pledge is candidate for next years Student Government President.

In our community drive, we are planning a block party toward the end of the semester. Children rate high on our list, especially those who are less fortunate than we are. In the second week in April we will entertain the children in the adolescent ward at Montifore Hospital in the Bronx. We are hoping to get a ballplayer from either the New York Jets or New York Yankees, depending on who is available at the time. If no one is available, we will go and entertain the kids to the best of our ability, for we as well as they are really looking forward to it. Last December we had our twelfth annual Christmas-Chanukah Party for the Children at the Monroe Hebrew Childrens Orphanage. It is the job of the chaplain during the Fall term to coordinate the party. To entertain the kids, Santa Claus took all thirty of them individually on his knee and gave



them all presents. We invited the neighborhood police and fire departments over and they let the kids sit in the police cars with the lights and siren going and they played on the fire engine. Their faces were sad as they left, waiting for Christmas day to come.

We the Brothers of the Epsilon Mu Chapter, at this time wish to express our deepest sympathy to the family and Epsilon Omega Brothers at Brooklyn Polytech, upon the passing of Brother Simeon Gang, Chancellor of Epsilon Omega, into Chapter Eternal on March 5, 1975. He worked hard for his Chapter as well as for the unification of the New York City chapters. Although some of us did not know Simeon personally, we paid our respects by attending the funeral and at a Shiva call.

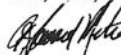
Dear Sidney:

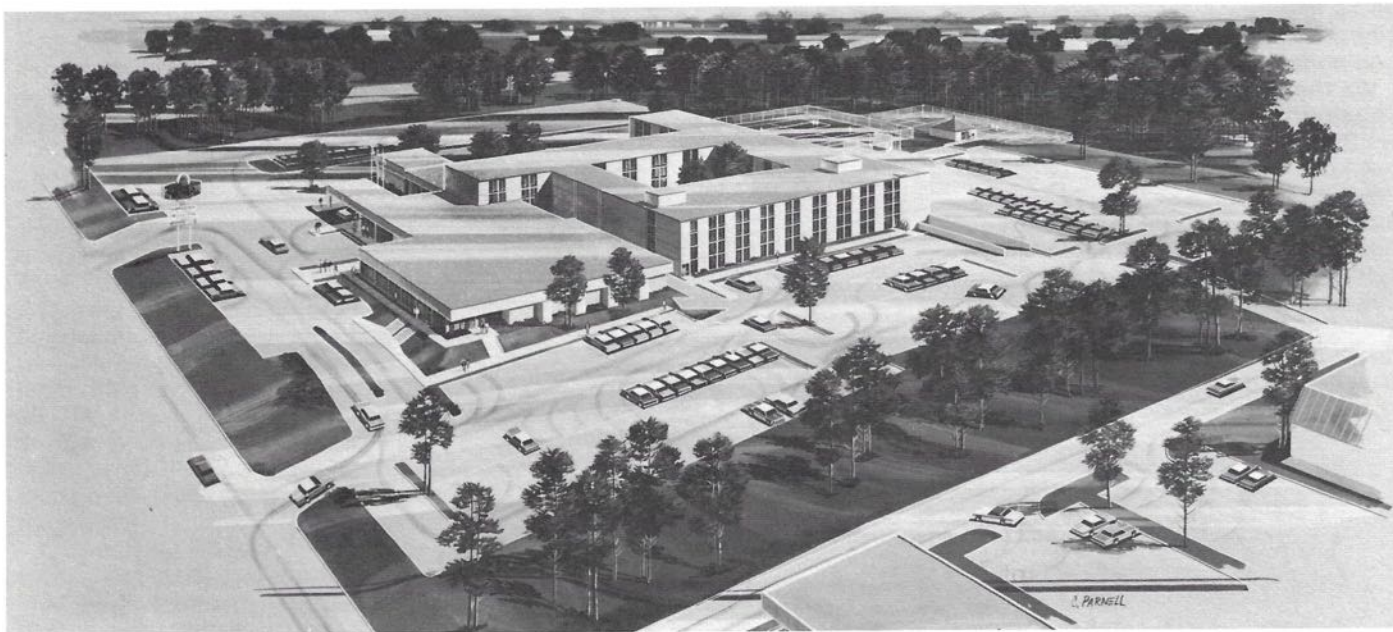

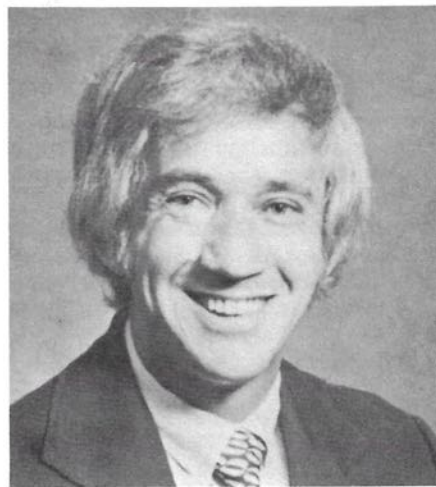
