## Convention '75

### THIRD CO-ED CONVENTION UNSURPASSED!

WITH the 65th International convention but a memory, those who attended its four full days of fun and fellowship will agree that this one has to be the greatest ever. Not only were the business sessions, and SCHOOL OF FRATERNALISM thoroughly absorbing and fruitful, but the schedule of luncheons, banquets, and social events were so enjoyable, that when the curtain rang down on Sunday morning, August 24th, none of the more than 150 delegates and alumni wanted to go home. The Convention began on a high note Wednesday evening with a sumptuous get-together cocktail party together with the Delta Phi Epsilon Sorority sisters. Following dinner, the first session was called to order, and the Convention was well under way with the appointment of committees, and the election of Grand Chapter (temporary) officers.

### HARRIS JACOBS ELECTED INTERNATIONAL PRESIDENT

### OUTSTANDING GRAND COUNCIL NAMED

IN electing Harris Jacobs of Atlanta to be the International President (consul) of the Fraternity for the next two years, the Convention chose a man who has given unselfish service to TEP both locally and nationally for almost 25 years. A native of Atlanta, Ga., Brother Jacobs attended the public schools of the City prior to enrolling at the University of Georgia where he was initiated into Nu chapter. His leadership ability was quickly recognized by his brothers, and after serving in several chapter offices, he was elected chancellor.

# Judge Louis B. Heller — TEPman of the Year 1975

ONE of the highlights of the Gala Honors & Awards Banquet of the Convention was the presentation of Brother Louis B. Heller of Epsilon (Fordham) as TEPman of the Year 1975 in recognition of his extraordinary range of accomplishments in a brilliant career that started with his graduation from Fordham Law School in 1926. Brother Heller, who is currently Justice of the New York Supreme Court, not only became a brilliant trial lawyer, but soon afterwards was elected to the New York State legislature where he served in both the lower house, and the State Senate. In 1949, in recognition of his legislative talents, Brother Heller was elected to the U. S. Congress where he served three terms, and became Chairman of several important Committees. From 1954 to 1965, he served as Judge of the New York Court of Spe-

cial Sessions, Justice of the New York City Court, and Judge of the New York Civil Court. In 1966, he was elevated to the New York Supreme Court, where he presently serves as Justice.

Not content to being an outstanding legislator, and jurist, Brother Heller lent his talents to writing and teaching. 1968 he authored "Do You Solemnly Swear?" — Doubleday Co., an absorbing account of how legal cases are won and lost in our courts, that has received high praise from both lawyers and laymen alike. Throughout his career, Brother Heller has lectured in the law at Yale Law School, Brooklyn Law School, St. Johns Law School, and New York Law School. Not surprisingly also, Brother Heller has written the lyrics to many popular songs!

Yes, Brother Heller, TEP is proud to count you as one of us.

The next three days plus were so delightfully filled with interesting and sometimes controversial business sessions, luncheons, banquets, and sight-seeing in beautiful Atlanta, that time moved entirely too quickly. A highlight of the 4 days was the Friday evening barbecue and dance and riverboat ride at world famous Stone Mountain, Ga., while the real "main event" took place on Saturday evening when the Gala Honors and Awards Banquet was held in the Grand Ballroom of the Radisson. In addition to the Delegates, and DPhiE sisters, more than 125 Atlanta TEP alumni with their wives were in attendance, making a grand total of almost 450 at the banquet presided over by Brother Elliott Levitas of Mu chapter, Congressman from the 4th District of Georgia, as Toastmaster. As noted elsewhere in this issue of the PLUME, it was at this function that the new Grand Council was installed, in addition to the presentation of the Man of the Year; Undergraduate of the Year; and Distinguished Alumnus Service recipient.

As in previous concurrent conventions, all luncheons, banquets, and social events were held jointly with Delta Phi Epsilon, while business sessions were held separately. One exception was the panel discussion on "Leadership Dynamics" which was held jointly and presided over by Brother Versacci, of the Grand Council.

## Sam Bredow Wins Service Award

IN recognition of his almost 25 years of continuous and dedicated service to Mu chapter at Emory, Brother Sam Bredow of Atlanta, was presented with the Michael C. C. Lilienfeld Distinguished Alumnus Service Award at the Gala Honors and Awards Banquet of the Convention. Brother Bredow, a prominent Atlanta businessman, took over as chapter advisor and financial counsellor to Mu chapter in the early fifties at a time when it appeared that the chapter would be bankrupt. Through dint of unselfish and devoted effort, he was able to pull the chapter through to financial stability, and by the time he retired as Advisor 10 years later, Mu chapter was one of the strongest chapters on the Emory campus. After turning the Advisorship of the chapter to Consul-elect Harris Jacobs, he has continued to serve the chapter as Treasurer of the Mu Holding Corp. to this day. He has truly "... served for the love of service ...".

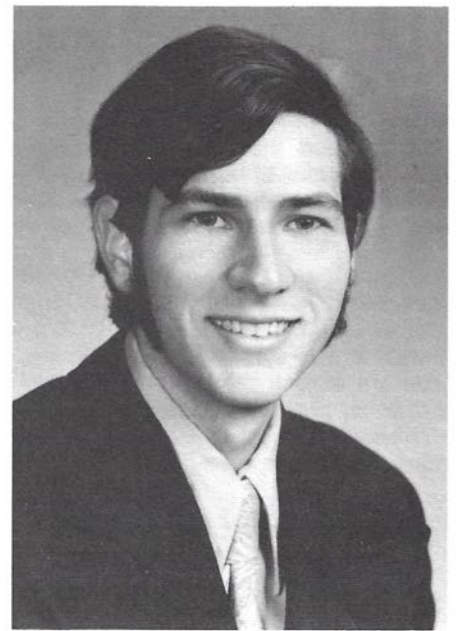

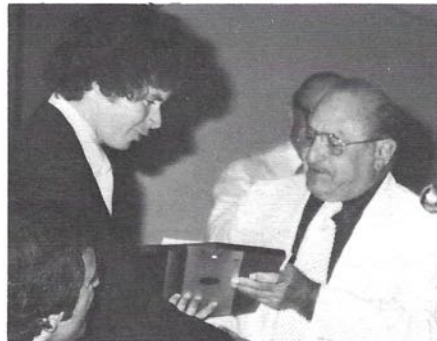

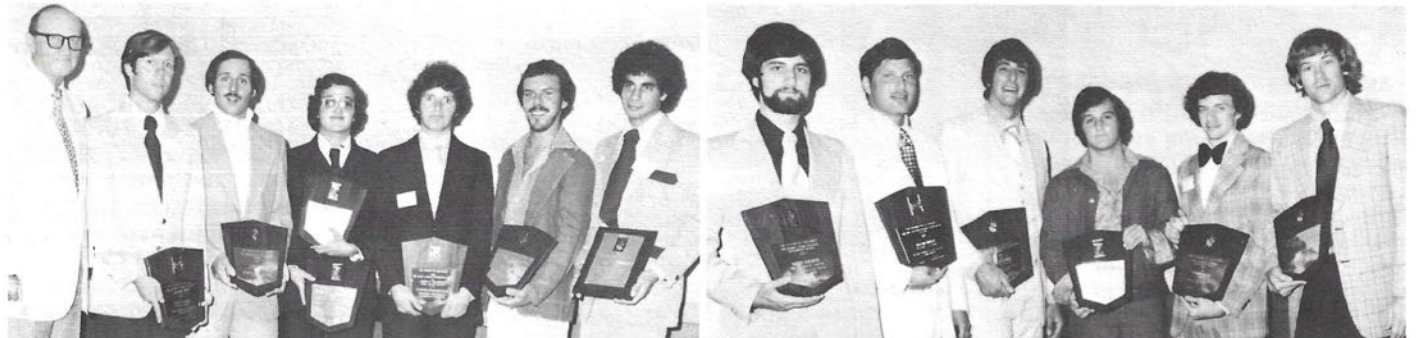

# Alumni Notes

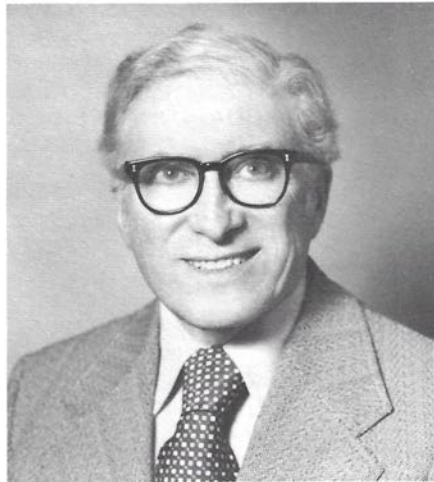

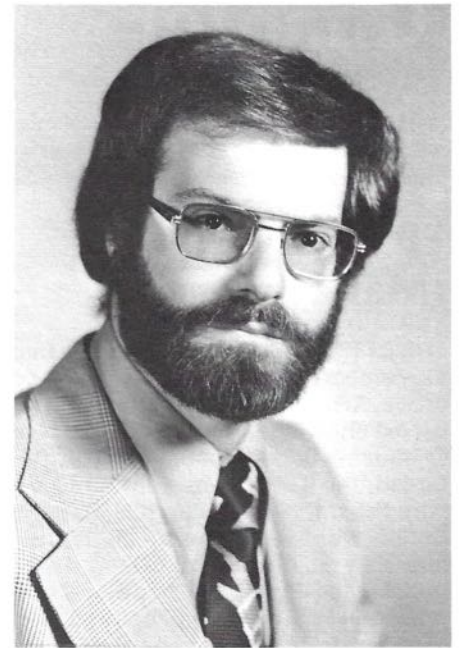

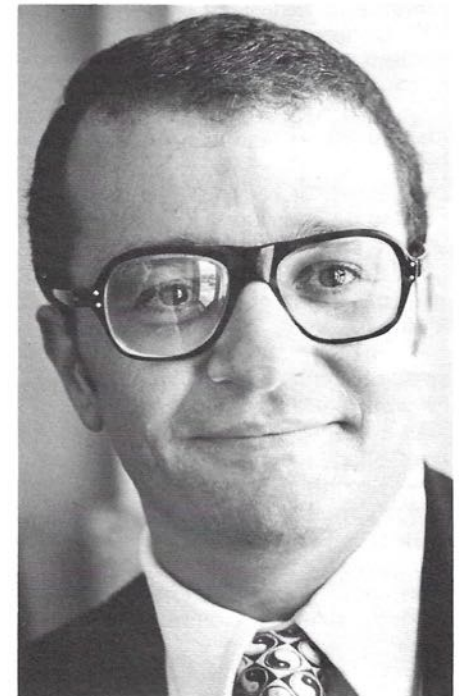

## ANNOUNCEMENT

THE President today announced the start of the twelfth nationwide search for outstanding young men and women to serve as White House Fellows.

Established in 1964, the White House Fellowship program is designed to give rising leaders one year of firsthand, high-level experience with the workings of the Federal Government and to increase their sense of participation in national affairs. The program is open to U.S. citizens from all fields who are not less than 23 and not more than 35 years of age. Employees of the Executive Branch of the Federal Government are not eligible, with the exception of career military personnel.

Members of the tenth group of White House Fellows are completing their year long assignments. An eleventh group, the 1975-76 White House Fellows, will begin their duties next month.

In addition to their work assignments as special assistants to the Vice President, Cabinet officers or principal members of the White House staff, the Fellows participate in an extensive education program that includes 150-200 off-the-record seminar meetings with top government officials, scholars, journalists, and leaders from the private sector. The 182 young men and women who have, to date, been selected as White House Fellows have included lawyers, scientists, engineers, corporate business executives and independent entrepreneurs, scholars and academic administrators, writers and journalists, medical doctors, social workers, architects, and local public officials. Last year 2307 applied for the coveted honor.

The Fellowship is designed to be a one-year sabbatical in public service. Fellows are expected to return to their professional careers at the end of their experience in government, with their perspectives of national issues broadened and their qualifications for significant service in their chosen careers and to their communities permanently enriched.

Leadership, intellectual and professional ability, high motivation, and a commitment to community and nation are the broad criteria employed in the selection process.

Requests for applications for next year's program must be postmarked not later than November 10, 1975. Application forms and additional information can be obtained from the President's Commission on White House Fellowships, Washington, D.C. 20415.
