## PLANS SET FOR ATLANTA BIENNIAL CONVENTION Concurrently with the Delta Phi Epsilon Sorority

FOR those of you who have had a yen to see what the "next great city of the world" is really like—now is your chance. From Wednesday, August 20th to Sunday August 24th, 1975, the third biennial concurrent TEP and DPhiE international convention will be held in the "Hub of the South"—ATLANTA, GEORGIA.

The beautiful Radisson Olympic Inn in Northeast Atlanta will be the convention headquarters. Although the Inn is only minutes away from all points of interest in the Atlanta area, it features a warm resort atmosphere and includes in its facilities: six tennis courts, four handball courts, two full size pools, a fully equipped health club, and golf nearby. Entertainment and dancing is featured nightly in the Inn's famous lounge.

The program includes an evening at world famous Stone Mountain, the eighth wonder of the world, at which time conventioners and guests will be taken on Stone Mountain's famous riverboat to dance to a genuine Dixieland band on board while enjoying a sumptuous southern buffet.

As in the two previous concurrent conventions with Delta Phi Epsilon Sorority, all social and banquet events will be held jointly, while business sessions will be held separately.

Brother Joe Gerson, past International President of TEP, and TEPman of the year for 1973 is Honorary Chairman, while Brothers Billy Waronker and Larry Liebross, both of Nu chapter will be co-chairmen. Nu chapter at Georgia, and Mu chapter at Emory will be co-hosts for the four night 5 day convention. "Y'ALL COME, Y' HEAH . . . it'll be the best one yet!"

Our chapter was on the verge of going inactive a few years ago but through an active rushing program we now have 83 active brothers. This is in part due to our latest pledge class being the biggest on the entire campus. This increase of 33 Nu brothers as of their recent initiation is the biggest boost of our membership in many years.

### Marathon Softball Game To Fight Leukemia

ON October 26, 1974 in Hartford, Conn., a marathon softball game was held to raise money for the Leukemia Society. The participants in the game included a group of young men from the Tau Epsilon Phi fraternity at the University of Hartford Phi Mu Chapter and another team made up of volunteers from the University of Hartford campus. The Tau Epsilon Phi team was later aided by the Rochester Institute of Technology Epsilon Nu Chapter who drove six hours from Rochester to join the cause. The game lasted for ten hours from eight in the morning till six that night. In all the two teams played softball for 63 innings before the game was called on account of darkness. All through the cold, early hours of the morning there was plenty of hot chocolate and doughnuts. The school provided lunch for the players and Burger King also helped out with free hamburgers and coke for everyone. After the game there was a spaghetti dinner and party at the TEP house.

The game culminated a six week effort by the Tau Epsilon Phi fraternity in which members went all around the Hartford community collecting pledges for money to go to the Leukemia Fund. The drive was directed and coordinated by two Tau Epsilon Phi fraternity members, Steve Altieri and Steve Slome. A good deal of the money raised came from the University of Hartford campus.

On December 14, a dinner party was held in which a check for \$592 was presented to Atty. Donald Weissman of West Hartford, Vice President of the board of trustees and to Mrs. Louise Smith, Executive Secretary, of the Leukemia Society in the Connecticut Valley. In return Tau Epsilon Phi fraternity received a plaque thanking them for their efforts to raise money for the research and cure for leukemia.

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# Alumni Notes

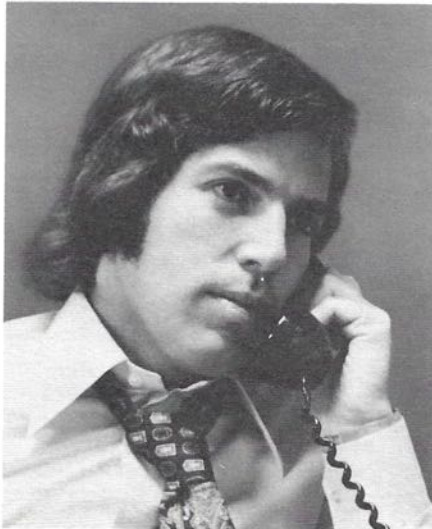


*Myer O. Sigal, Tau Alpha (Florida)*

## A CASE FOR LIFE SPONSORSHIP

### An open letter to alumni

YOU have heard the expression before, but—"We've got some bad news and some good news."

The bad news is that with chapters reactivating, and others needing rehabilitation and refurbishing of their houses, complicated by the spiraling inflation that we are in, the National Endowment Fund is being increasingly hard put to meet the needs. Unless substantial help can be gotten from alumni, we will have to curtail our program of assistance to chapters.

The good news is that the "Frat is Back"—unquestionably there is a strong resurgence of fraternity interest all over the Continent, with the turmoil years on campuses, but a distant memory. As noted above, we are in the process of reactivating 4 chapters, and almost all chapters have reported larger pledge classes so far this year.

Even more good news! Your alumni dues and Life Sponsorship fees are not going up in price—at least for the moment. If you will stop and think, you'll realize that there are very few things that have not gone up in price in the past few years, but your alumni dues and Life fees are in this category. We hope to be able to keep them the same for a while longer, but we can't promise.

THE ONLY FIRM PROMISE WE CAN MAKE NOW IS THIS: IF YOU ARE NOT NOW A LIFE SPONSOR, YOU MAY JOIN NOW AND KNOW THAT YOUR DUES WILL NEVER INCREASE. Certainly, if the inflation continues, both annual dues and Life Sponsorship fees must be increased, and the pressure for increasing Life Sponsorship fees is even greater. This is so because the money paid in for Life Sponsorship is not spent, but is invested throughout the lifetime of the member, in chapter housing, with only the interest earned annually being spent.

Perhaps it's worth repeating here what Life Sponsorship costs. If an alumnus is out of school less than 5 years, it is \$100.00, payable either in one lump sum, or in 5 annual payments of \$20.00 each. If, on the other hand, you are out of school more than 5 years, the fee is \$150.00, once again, payable either in one lump sum, or in 5 equal annual instalments of \$30.00 each. Once you are enrolled in the cycle leading to Life Sponsorship, we never have to send another bill, and we don't lose you as a member.

So, take advantage of this bargain, and know at the same time that you are giving your fraternity the support that it desperately needs. Please!!

### CONVENTION FACTS

Like all our previous conventions, the rate will be for a complete package including taxes and tips, all food (3 meals a day), cocktail party, and the evening at Stone Mountain. In order to accommodate local alumni and undergrads, or those who do not care to stay at the Inn, we are listing each function with its own fee. ## Jurists Gather To Honor Brother Kaufman

AN extraordinary assemblage of eminent jurists convened on November 1st, 1974 to honor Former TEPMAN OF THE YEAR Irving Kaufman, Epsilon (Fordham) who is Chief Judge of the United States Court of Appeals for the second Circuit. Brother Kaufman was celebrating a quarter of century of service on the Federal Bench.

Flanked by Supreme Court Justice Thurgood Marshall and retired Justice Tom C. Clark and before an audience of 150 judges and lawyers, Brother Kaufman was widely praised for the quality of his decisions over the past 25 years, and his untiring efforts toward

court reform. Appointed in 1949 when he was but 39 years old, Brother Kaufman became the youngest Federal Judge in the country. In the following years, Brother Kaufman has presided over a wide range of historic cases, including the notorious Rosenberg atom spy trial; the Appalachian Crime Syndicate case; and in 1961 ordered the closing of the Lincoln school in New Rochelle, N.Y. on the ground that districts in that city had been drawn to keep that school all black.

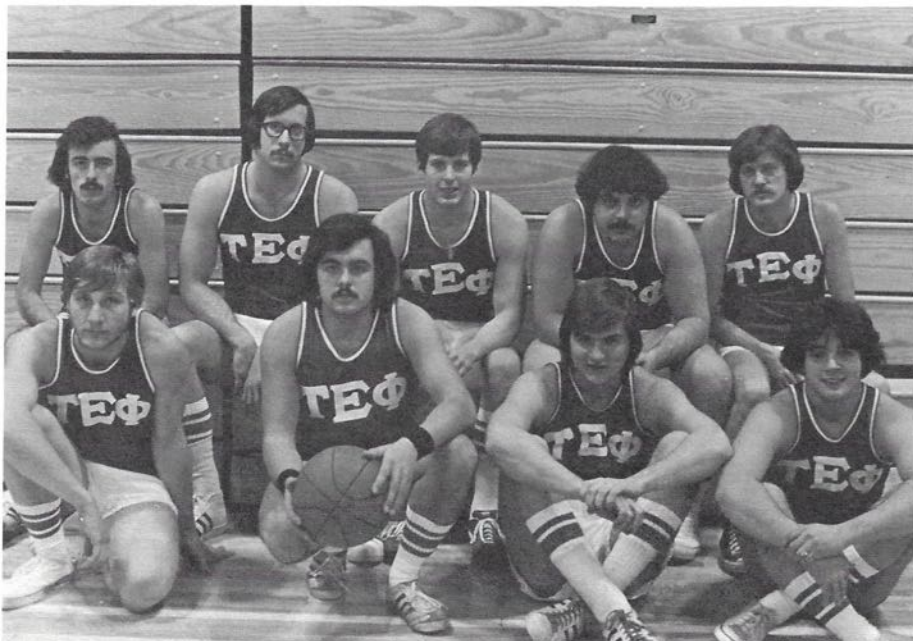
In many legal and judicial quarters, Brother Kaufman is considered a prime candidate for elevation to the Supreme Court.

On the academic front, Omega is ranked either number one or two among fraternities, for highest grade average (the final tally has yet to be completed). 40% of this chapter was able to finish the semester with a 3.8 G.P.A. or better. # The New York Times

According to a recent *New York Times* survey, the word is out that fraternities and sororities, which fell on hard times during the social activism of the nineteen-sixties, are enjoying a resurgence on many campuses.

"Like the students," the Times reports, "the organizations are different from those of a decade ago." In their interviews on 12 campuses in all sections of the U.S. they found that "fraternity and sorority life is now marked by more academic seriousness and even social consciousness."

Members of the sororities and fraternities and university officials attribute the trend to "a decline in social activism, the new academic seriousness engendered in part by the job market and what is often described as the general 'return to normalcy' that marks most aspects of college life these days."

Asked about their reasons for joining the fraternity and sorority system, students generally responded with terms such as "security" or "close personal relationships." Others cite practical reasons such as living and eating at the house as better and more economical. The study found that while some people might not agree with the fraternity system, they are not attacking it either.

If student attitudes have changed, so have the purposes and styles of the fraternities and sororities, the *Times* study continues. "Many members report . . . that they are now more in tune with the general academic purposes of the institutions. . . . The social consciousness of the last decade has also apparently had some effect on fraternity and sorority life." They are becoming more involved in community activities, helping needy people and exploring issues relevant to today's society.
