Our chancellor, Bob Elias, finished up the program by speaking about the present status of the chapter. He expressed the hope to continue a strong relationship with our

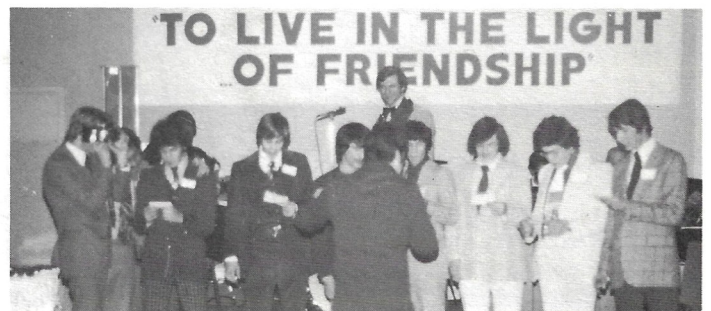


From l to r Samuel Strauss, Bernard Levy, Bert Shaiman at Epsilon Eta 20th Anniversary Celebration.

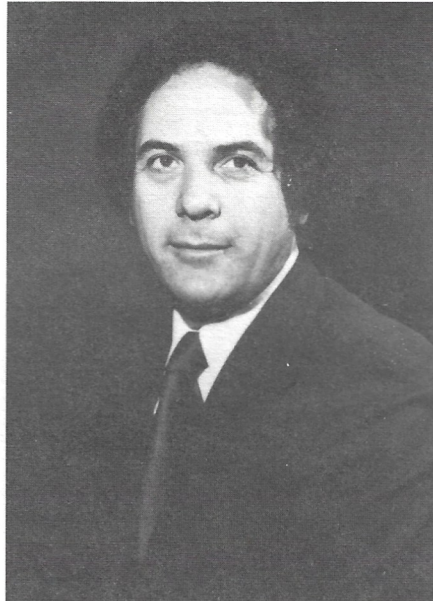

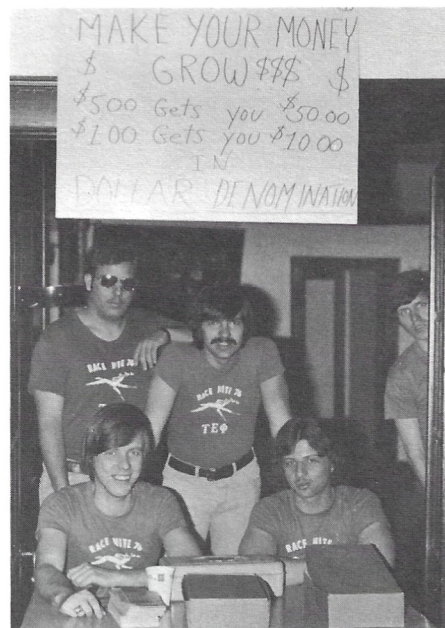
Gary Chabot, we feel that "TEP IS TOPS" at the University of Lowell.

Pow! Zam! "TEP Comics"?!?

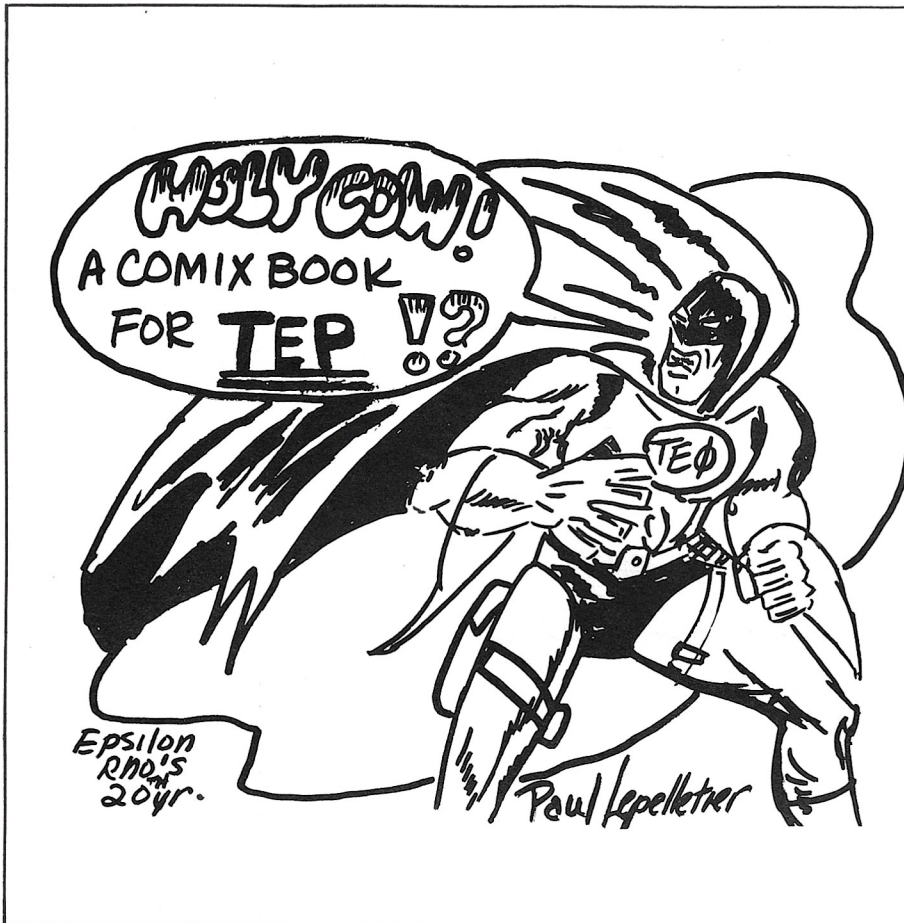
