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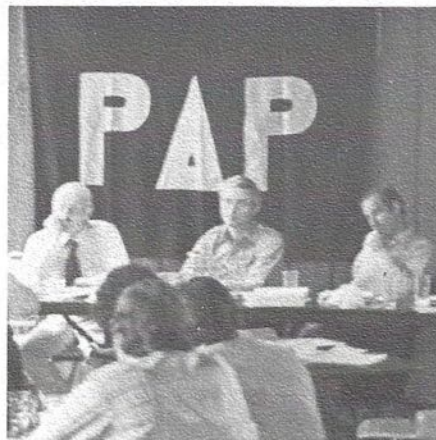

Grand Council Meets with Midwest Conclave

The cover story for this occasion was that of a grand council meeting as well as a conclave held at the Rho Delta Rho Chapter house.

It has been a long time since TEP Actives have seen a grand council meeting within their hallowed halls, even rarer is a conclave.



The conclave brought together undergraduates representing Rho Delta Rho (Chicago), Epsilon Tau (Peoria, Ill.), Psi (U. of Ill.), Phi Epsilon (Eastern Mich. U.), Phi Beta (Tampa, Florida), and Gamma Sigma (Rutgers U., N.J.).

Topics discussed at the conclave consisted of chapter problems and concerns with National, concerns with Legislation for TEP Convention 77, pledge rap sessions and student aid discussions. The grand council also conducted their own rap session topped off with bagels, lox and cream cheese.

During these meetings, various chapters voiced concern on issues

such as chapter visits by National, National's policy towards monetary affairs and co-ed issues.

And so as dusk approached on October 10, 1976, the TEP Nationals left Chicago for their homefires.

Perhaps coordinated grand council meetings and conclaves of this type can serve to bring TEP Activists and Nationals even closer, shuttle diplomacy seems a good idea, let's keep it.

Gordan B. Stine, D.D.S., Upsilon-Mu (Charleston-Emory) has been elected president of the Alumni Association of the College of Charleston in Charleston, South Carolina. Dr. Stine's Term, which began in June 1976, will last for one year.

Brother Milton Rosenkranz, Delta (Cornell) a prominent North Jersey attorney for almost 50 years, was tendered a most unique 71st birthday party. His former law clerks gathered in the Waldorf-Astoria Hotel, New York to honor Brother Rosenkranz on his birthday. Among the law clerks of the almost 50 years past who worked for Bro. Rosenkranz included a former Governor of New Jersey, an appellate division Judge, 2 Superior Court Judges, assistant Speaker of the N.J. Legislature, a County Counsel, a State Senator, and the Mayor of Clifton, N.J. all were in attendance.

David W. Jamieson, Epsilon Eta (Drexel), Regional Governor for West Coast, has received his Ph.D. from the

Graduate School of Management, UCLA. Dr. Jamieson will continue in his current position as Senior Associate with Management Responsibility Guidance Corporation, a Los Angeles-based consulting firm. In addition, Dr. Jamieson has been appointed to a teaching position at the University of Southern California in the area of Organization Design and Development and was recently elected to the Board of Directors of the American Society for Training and Development — Los Angeles Chapter.

Three TEP Greats Pass On

S. Charles Lerner, Delta (Cornell) #34 was chiefly responsible for the reactivation of Delta chapter following World War I. Following his graduation from Cornell in 1919, he organized the Delta Alumni Club and served as its President for 10 years. At the same time he became active in National affairs serving as Editor of the PLUME and member of the Grand Council. At his death, he was a Trustee of the Endowment Fund. In recognition of his devoted service to the Fraternity he was awarded the Lilienfeld Distinguished Alumnus Service Award in 1975.

Jack R. Kates, Tau Gamma (U. So. Cal.) #15 was a founding member of the Tau Gamma chapter and served as Chancellor of his chapter. Following his graduation from Law School, he became Regional Governor for the West Coast Region, and was the chief motivating factor in the establishment of the UCLA and Santa Barbara chapters during his term of office which lasted 11 years. In 1956 he was awarded the Lilienfeld Distinguished Alumnus Service Award for his dedicated and devoted service to the National Fraternity, and to his chapter.

Bernard S. Levy, Zeta Lambda Phi (Temple) #79 served as Chancellor of his chapter, and after entering into the practice of law, was elected to the Grand Council of the Fraternity and served on the Council without interruption until his death in November, 1976. Subsequently, he was elected a Trustee of the TEP Scholarship and Student Aid Fund, Inc. He also served as President of the Zeta Lambda Phi Alumni Club.
