BROTHER William L. (Bill) Waronker (Nu 242) and Mrs. Waronker were guests at The White House for the signing of the Egyptian-Israeli Peace Treaty held in Washington on March 26th. After the ceremonies held on the lawn of The White House in the afternoon, a State dinner was held in the evening under a large tent with more than 1300 guests in attendance to honor President Carter, President Sadat and Prime Minister Begin. Bill said that the experience was the most rewarding of his life. Being a TEP must have had something to do with the seating arrangements. The table that Bill and his wife sat at was front row center. To the

Waronker's left was the table of Vice President Mondale and his guests and to their right was the table seating President Carter, President Sadat, Prime Minister Begin, their wives and other dignitaries. The Waronker's were warmly greeted by President and Mrs. Carter, Prime Minister and Mrs. Begin and members of the Sadat family. Shortly before the March 26th peace signing Mrs. Waronker was named to the Commission on Presidential Scholars by President Carter. The Waronker's have three children. Daughter Sherry, soon to be a sophomore at the University of North Carolina, son Jay, a senior in high school and daughter, Jody.

ON Sunday November 19th, 1978, the Alumni faced the undergrad brothers in the annual Turkey Bowl. An unexpectedly large crowd turned out to see the old grads emerge victorious once again, drubbing the youngsters by a score of 20 to 0.

The powerful Alumni team was lead by QB Ken Marconi, who cleverly mixed his plays to guide his team over the spirited undergraduates. It was a hard-fought first half with the Alumni leaving the field ahead only 6 to 0 after Marconi hit TE Tom Mielowocki for a thirty-yard scoring strike late in the stanza. In the second half the outcome became clear, as the ferocious Alumni defense, which included Bob Arra, Cal Maradonna, and Harry Welsh at the linebackers and Roger Butler and Mike Chewkanes at the safeties, repeatedly shut down the brotherhood attack. The offense began to wear down the over-matched brothers in the latter part of the game with offensive linemen Ben Kircher, Mike Angelini and Bob Longo blasting holes for running backs Bill Bruey and Al Luzi and ultimately setting up two more scoring tosses to Frank Salvati and John Sateja. Fine defensive plays by Brad Smith and Paul Loane preserved the shutout.

Proposed Convention Legislation

THE international constitution provides that each chapter and active alumni club must be given notice of constitutional amendments that are to be considered by the grand chapter. Notice is hereby given.

MEMBERSHIP. By the Alumni Association of Epsilon Lambda — College of the city of New York.

The proposal would remove the word "male" from the definition of eligibility. The amendment further provides for each chapter to determine whether it would allow female members.

MEMBERSHIP. By the Epsilon Phi Chapter — The Pennsylvania State University.

The proposal provides for an official recognition of Little Sisters.

REGIONAL GOVERNANCE. By the Rho Delta Rho Alumni Association — Illinois Institute of Technology.

The proposal would re-align region F to include only eastern Pennsylvania and southern New Jersey, and create a region N encompassing western Pennsylvania, West Virginia and Ohio.

COMPOSITION OF THE GRAND COUNCIL. By the Rho Delta Rho Alumni Association — Illinois Institute of Technology.

The proposal would reduce the number of members-at-large from twenty-nine to twenty-two.

UNDERGRADUATE FEES. By the Grand Council.

The proposal would raise the annual head tax from \$16 to \$21. The \$1 SSAF tax would be unchanged.

ADMINISTRATIVE STAFF. By the Executive Committee of the Grand Council.

The proposal would retire the title "Executive Secretary" with Brother Suntag and provide that the fraternity's Chief Administrative Officer be the "Executive Director."

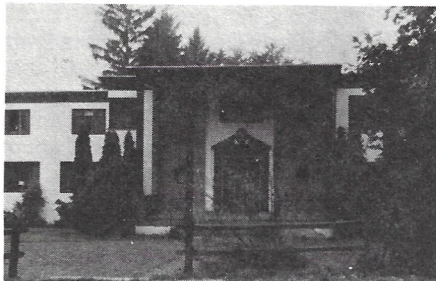

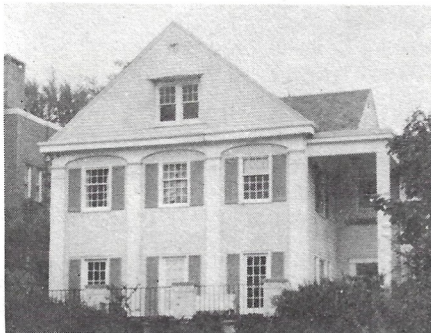
in the PHI PSI 500, a charitable event which involves both running and beer-chugging. We were happy to have left our mark in Collegetown where the PHI PSI is held.

little or nothing to the students. We got the nothing! That is why we built our unique house deck, and dedicated it to the USC ticket office.

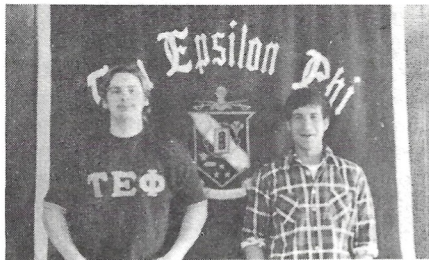

The after picture was taken during our nurd party at which Frank won the best looking award.

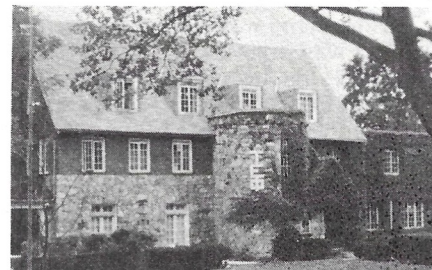
