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In Memoriam

On April 7th "Doc" I. Schwartz, Alpha 1, entered the Chapter Eternal at age 91.

"Doc" was active with the Fraternity from our founding until his retirement due to ill health in 1968 and was affectionately known as the "grand old man of TEP." He organized the Fraternity's endowment fund in 1922 and chaired the Fund for 34 of the next 36 years, relinquishing the chair in 1936 and 1937 to serve as Consul (International President).

At the request of Doc's sons Justin, Gamma (NYU) and Toby, Delta (Cornell) we will print no obituary beyond this brief resume of "Doc's" activities. Instead we reprint "The Bridge Builder," which he often quoted.

The Bridge Builder

An old man, going a lone highway,
Came at the evening, cold and gray,

Grand Council

An Undergrad's View

It's been about 10 months since the convention in Orlando; that place where myself and four other undergraduates were elected to Council. When we were elected I can remember us joking about how nice it was going to be. We had been in other organizations as officers and we figured that the "Frat Council" would be the same way, a "free ride." The "call" was heard, see you in New York, in Washington, in New Orleans, in Philly . . . I realize now that we were quite misinformed.

Mu Chapter was the extent of my identification with Tau Epsilon Phi. In my chapter, meetings tended to be a joke. Things got railroaded through and eventually got done by one or two motivated Brothers at the last minute. More often than not, it was "How did the Islanders do?" "The Jets are going to be a powerhouse this year." "Miami is a great place to get sun and get . . ." Surely the National meetings would be the same, just on a larger scale.

We were wrong again; and it didn't take long for us to find out. The first meeting of the newly elected Grand Council was in New York in October. About a week prior to the meeting we received the agenda. It included the items to be dealt with by the complete Grand Council on October 21, as well as, the items that the Officers of Council and the members of the Scholarship and Student Aid Fund (SSAF) would deal with. It was hard for me to believe that we were actually going to deal with all of those things in one day. George said that it was going to be a "real" meeting.

In order to understand Grand Council, you must understand how the Fraternity is organized. Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity is a Corporation. There are two main divisions of this Corporation. Each has its own officers and its own duties. There is a division known as TEP Properties. It handles the financing and management of a few of our Chapters, as well as, improvement loans to the other Chapters. While the money you send in to National can be made available for a loan, it is not used for the fiscal management of these chapters. TEP Properties is responsible for lease programs, mortgage programs, loan policies, and loan applications. It relies on its investments for income. The other division of the Corporation is the Grand Council. It is made up of a Consul (President), Vice Consuls, Undergraduate Members-at-Large, Alumni, a Tribune (Secretary), a Quaestor

(Treasurer), and their assistants. These people deal with the "Fraternity" aspects of the Fraternity. This includes such items as: Expansion, Membership, Chapter Status, Undergraduate Collections, Awards, and Budget approval. Council also has a say in whether or not the suggestions of TEP Properties are implemented.

There is a separate organization that plays an important part in our Fraternity. This is The TEP Foundation Inc. (formerly the Scholarship and Student Aid Fund Inc.). It is responsible for scholarships, student loans and the fund raising and collections necessary to keep these programs running.

Getting back to the meetings now, the agenda was chocked full of items. We very quickly understood that it didn't leave any room for fooling around. Our "free ride" was going to be hard work. We were being entrusted with some important decisions that had to be made regarding our Chapters and our Fraternity as a whole. We could not take these decisions lightly. They would effect us all.

Our meeting in April was much of the same. Out of this meeting came some very

There were times as undergraduates that we were undecided as to which direction our college work would take; times when we encountered personal or social problems; times when we walked the fence between success and failure; times when our hopes seemed limited by our finances. Through all of these times the Fraternity, the brotherhood, and the guidance available to me seemed to provide both direction and positive reinforcement.
