The six specific development areas addressed by TEP 2000 include: (1) Organizational Structure, (2) Staff Structure, (3) Fraternity Undergraduate Programs, (4) The TEP Foundation, (5) the TEP Properties Division, and (6) Alumni Relations.

In the past year, Consul Gordon and the members of the Grand Council have endeavored to more the Fraternity and the TEP Foundation closer to the goals established in our Long Range plan.

During the Convention Banquet Consul Gordon introduced **TEP 2000 - A Bridge to the Future** calling the document: *"the Fraternity's Long Range plan for the decade of the '90s and beyond. Our plan consists of six action areas, each with an overall goal and a list of implementation steps. It is simple and direct. Our first objective is the creation of a functional and working organizational structure supported by dedicated alumni volunteers. The development of a staff capable of servicing the needs of the Fraternity and its constituent parts goes hand in hand with this strong volunteer organization. Our third goal is the establishment and maintenance of strong chapters and the well-managed real estate operation that ensures safe living conditions for all undergraduates."*

TEP 2000 - "the Fraternity's Long Range plan for the decade of the '90s and beyond."

Since last August, the Grand Council has been hard at work addressing those areas of the Fraternity that require revision and redirection. Plans are now underway to introduce a series of wide reaching Chapter Standards that will

provide our undergraduate membership with the road map to excellence for years to come. Additionally, the Council has embarked on an ambitious plan to reinvolve alumni throughout the nation with our chapters and undergraduate brothers.

Gordon also added that the goal of TEP 2000 is to *"foster an atmosphere where alumni are proud to be associated and identified with Tau Epsilon Phi."* And, the overall *"intent is to enhance the college experience for the undergraduate membership through ... educational*

TEP 2000 - A Bridge to the Future represents the efforts of many alumni volunteers over a period of several years to formulate a working plan that will guide the Brotherhood of Tau Epsilon Phi into the next century and beyond.

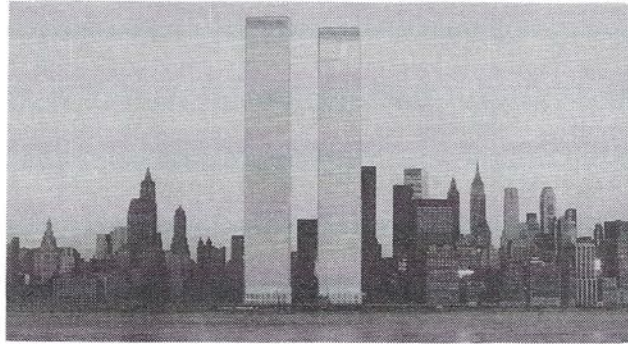

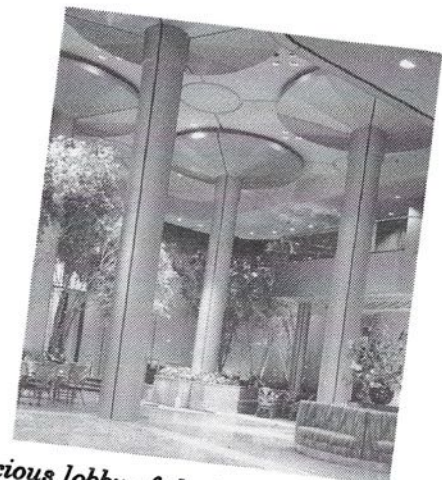

In recognition of this historic event, the Grand Council of Tau Epsilon Phi and the Board of Trustees of The TEP Foundation have agreed to consolidate the fund raising efforts and dues campaigns of both organizations into one Annual Fund Campaign administered by the Foundation.

I am concerned when even one of our brothers stops supporting $\text{TE}\Phi$ and when we lose touch with fellow members. Each person has the ability to give as much as he'd like. With that in mind, I'm asking you to give whatever you can. Please take this moment to complete the enclosed form to continue contributing to our Annual Fund.

The TEP Foundation

Incorporation:

The TEP Foundation was incorporated under the Laws of the State of Georgia originally as the TEP Student Aid and Scholarship Fund.

The Aims:

As set forth in part, in Section three of the Certificate of Incorporation, the aims of the incorporators are as follows:

"To operate solely and exclusively as a charitable, literary or educational organization not for profit with the power to acquire, administer, hold, invest, reinvest, sell, exchange, lease or otherwise dispose of such funds, securities, and other property, real or personal, as may be received by it from gifts, bequests, grants, contributions, purchases, or otherwise; the net income from which shall be used exclusively for charitable, literary, or educational purposes and particularly for scholarships, student aid, loans and assistance to needy and deserving students, recognition of high scholastic attainment and the development and fostering of the aims and purposes of the TEP Fraternity."

Tax Exemption:

By its letter the U.S. Treasury Department has ruled that the Foundation is exempt from income tax, that contributions thereto are deductible as provided in law, by the donors; that bequests, legacies, devises or transfers to the use of the Foundation are deductible in computing the value of the taxable estate of a decedent and that gifts for the use of the Foundations are deductible in computing taxable gifts.

About the Money:

The basic policy of the Foundation, as set forth by the Trustees, is to

preserve the capital funds, and invest them for income and possible capital growth.

Presently, the income from invested funds is used to provide annual scholarship awards to undergraduate level TEP actives on the basis of financial need, demonstrated scholarship, and creative participation in chapter and campus activities.

Funds are also provided to support the improvement of scholarship within the chapters by the Fraternity's traveling staff personnel.

The general expenses of the Foundation are minimal, consisting mainly of office costs, CPA audit fees, registration fees, occasional legal fees and miscellaneous expenses.

Administration:

The affairs of the Foundation are administered by a Board of Trustees made up of alumni of various chapters. Principal office is at 3088 Mercer University Drive, Suite 200, Atlanta, Georgia 30341.

The Trustees:

Trustees receive no salary or compensation.

Scholarship Awards:

Invitations to apply for scholarship awards are tendered to all chapters each Spring. Application requirements are comprehensive, and include statement of participation in chapter and campus activities, and letter of recommendation from Chapter Advisor.

The applications are studied, independently, by the Awards Committee. Each reviewing Trustee rates the application on the basis of

scholarship, fraternal service, and participation in extracurricular activities.

These independent Trustee ratings on the three factors are then collated to a final award sequence, and each applicant is notified by mail of the disposition of his application.

Unfortunately, there never are enough funds to provide financial help to all clearly worthy applicants. But, the responses from the recipients frequently declare that the money awards forestall interruption or even termination of undergraduate work.

Many of these TEP scholars receive degrees with honors and go on to graduate studies. All TEPs can be proud of these young men, and prouder still for having helped them, when it is most needed, to continue in college.

Alumni Giving Club and Life Sponsor Program:

To recognize those alumni who have contributed to the TEP Foundation, the Board of Trustees has established several giving club levels. Each club designates a particular level of contribution and is identified by significant symbols of the Fraternity.

Furthermore, the Board of Trustees continues to solicit Life Sponsors. Those men who have made contributions of \$450 or more shall be designated as Life Sponsors with an appropriate recognition of their support placed in the National Headquarters. The Life Sponsors of the Fraternity have long been the cornerstone of our alumni support.

Please note that a form is enclosed for you to note your gift and return it to National Headquarters.

Tax-Wise Gifting

Gifts to the TEP Foundation can be made in many ways (other than outright gifts of cash) providing special tax benefits or income benefits to donor. Below are a few ideas for you to consider:

Direct Gift of Appreciated Securities allow donor to secure income tax deduction for current value of securities and avoid need to recognize taxable gain on unrealized appreciation over initial purchase cost (certain exceptions exist and need to be planned on an individual basis).

Charitable Gift Annuity Arrangement provides donor with lifetime income and current charitable contribution income tax deduction. It is possible to purchase annuity using appreciated

securities, in which case unrealized gain on securities would not be subject to taxation on transfer to the Foundation. In many cases, the annuity income would be higher than income which was provided by the securities used to purchase the annuity.

Transfer of Ownership of Existing Life Insurance provides donor with current charitable contribution income tax deduction equal to the "value" of the policy which is transferred. Future premium payments on the policy by donor will also provide charitable income deduction.

Charitable Remainder Trusts provide donor (and possibly spouse and/or children) with lifetime income as well as current charitable contribution income tax deduction. If appreciated

securities are used to fund the trust, there would be no current income tax on unrealized appreciation for the securities at time of transfer.

Beneficiary Designation Under Will and/or Living Trust provides charitable gift deduction against future values on death of donor. (This can be arranged to provide income to spouse and/or children during their lifetime.)

Each person's circumstances require individualized planning. The TEP Foundation's Board of Trustees can work with you and your other advisors to ensure that you realize maximum benefit from your charitable gifting. Please contact the TEP Foundation for additional information.

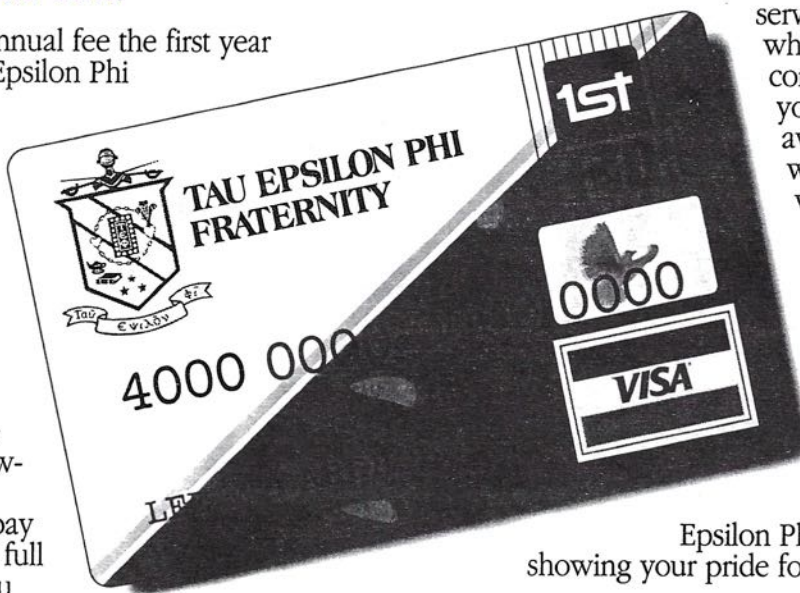
