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
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The Consul's Corner

With the school year behind us and the summer months in full swing, it's the perfect moment to take a breath, reflect on our momentum, and look ahead to the next chapter for Tau Epsilon Phi.

Last month, I had the privilege of attending the 2025 TEP Leadership Retreat in the Pocono Mountains. Sitting quietly at the back of the room, I observed 40 of our undergraduate leaders engage in passionate, thoughtful dialogue. Their discussions ranged from risk management strategies to creative ideas for recruitment, and what stood out most was their professionalism, maturity, and clear commitment to strengthening their chapters. For two and a half days, these young men were fully present, deeply engaged, and eager to build a better future for our fraternity.

Experiences like this reinforce the importance of education and leadership development within Tau Epsilon Phi. The college environment is evolving rapidly. Campus administrators are more watchful, and with every student carrying a camera in their pocket, accountability is immediate. Our undergraduates face a level of scrutiny and complexity that many of us as alumni never encountered. That's why it's critical we equip them not just to succeed... but to lead.

To that end, the Grand Council has been hard at work identifying ways to support and strengthen the bonds that define our brotherhood. Four exciting initiatives are now underway:

1. A Day of National Service: Plans are in motion for our first-ever National Philanthropy Day. This will be a unified effort where every chapter will participate in giving back to their communities. This isn't just about service; it's about demonstrating our values through collective action.

- 2. Smarter Recruitment, Broader Reach: We're launching a recruitment support strategy that embraces modern tools... using geo-targeted social media ads on platforms like Instagram and Reddit. This approach meets potential members where they are and ensures that the name Tau Epsilon Phi is visible, relevant, and welcoming.
- 3. A Digital Home Worth Visiting: Our national website is undergoing a complete overhaul—not just a cosmetic update, but a strategic redesign. The new site will better engage undergraduates, reconnect alumni, and effectively tell the TEP story. Just as importantly, it will serve as a compelling first impression for prospective members and their parents, showcasing who we are, what we stand for, and why Tau Epsilon Phi is a brotherhood worth joining.
- 4. Bridging the Gap from College to Career: Through a national mentorship program, we plan to actively connect graduating seniors with alumni in their chosen fields. Whether it's career advice, networking, or just a brother who's been there before, this initiative reinforces our lifelong commitment to one another.

These initiatives aren't just ideas on paper, but rather part of a strategic vision we're actively shaping to grow and sustain our fraternity. Much like the engaged and thoughtful brothers I observed in the Poconos, they reflect a future filled with promise, purpose, and momentum.

TEP Holds Regional Summer Leadership Conclaves Across the Nation

Webster's Dictionary defines a conclave as a gathering of a group or association. Tau Epsilon Phi views a conclave as a gathering of representatives from each Chapter at a host institution to discuss relevant Fraternal matters, hold workshops, share war stories and just have a good time.

This summer, Tau Epsilon Phi is holding eight Summer

Leadership Conclaves in major regional areas throughout the nation. The purpose of these conclaves is to educate the undergraduate participants on issues ranging from Rush & Recruitment, Leadership Development and Chapter Administration to Risk Management and Fraternity House Maintenance.

Over 200 Brothers representing every active chapter and colony have registered for the conclaves which are being held in Miami, Atlanta, Washington, Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Chicago, and Los Angeles during July and August. The weekend conclaves have been scheduled to allow the highest level of attendance by undergraduate leaders in close proximity to their homes while at the same time eliminating costs for travel and housing.

The conclaves provide a tremendous opportunity for our chapters' leaders to

learn and grow together while at the same time assist each other in solving the problems which exist as a normal part of fraternity life. The program planned will revolve around a series of seminars and discussions covering all areas of the undergraduate fraternity.

The fraternity world is everchanging and 1988 has definitely been a trying year for Greek men and the nation's Greek systems. Discussions will be held to address issues such as

the rising concerns about hazing and alcohol related accidents and deaths.

And, as the levels of responsibility increase for Greek leaders so must our chapters learn to cultivate young men into leadership positions within their individual groups. In order to focus on this need, TEP National has prepared a new Leadership

> Development manual which will be introduced during these sessions as well.

Another topic for the conferences will be Chapter Organization and Administration. Although each institution's Greek system is arranged differently, the National Fraternity has standards for both chapter performance and administration which will be reviewed by the conclave staff. Also, the National Headquarters has recently undergone several major changes in the programs, resources and materials available to all undergraduates and alumni which will be previewed and discussed.

The National Fraternity holds Regional Conclaves and Leadership Seminars every other summer, during off-convention years. The Conclaves are funded through donations to the TEP Foundation Inc. and from monetary gifts dedicated to furthering the educa-

gitts dedicated to furthering the educational purposes of both the Fraternity and the Foundation. Although the costs of these valuable meetings are clearly outweighed by the knowledge gained, it is important to note that by providing events such as these, the undergraduates are given the opportunity to take back to the chapters the tools which will assist them in the operation of their individual groups.

leadership, breed arrogance that results in bad habits, as we shall see.

During the past five years, the fraternity system has enjoyed its strongest resurgence in more than a quarter of a century. Not only have new chapters in all Nationals proliferated (TEP alone has added 17 new colonies and interest groups during the past year), but also membership in most existing chapters has literally exploded. Rarely ever has there been such a demand for fraternity membership!

Possibly because of this phenomenon, serious behavior problems have arisen in many fraternity chapters throughout the continent. The media has reported an inordinate number of hazing, drinking

and other serious disorders in fraternity chapters, leading to suspensions and worse. Is it possible that arrogance has emerged as a by-product of this closeness that has made fraternity the world's greatest youth movement? Does this portend an adverse reaction by college administrations and future prospective members that would threaten the continued well-being of the world's greatest youth movement? Obviously, unless undergraduate and alumni leadership take hold and reverse the unfortunate trend that became apparent during the past year, then the system which is entitled "the greatest" may not deserve to survive.



The Value of a Fraternity

A fraternity can be important to a student's personal and academic development. From a personal standpoint, you will form long and lasting friendships. You will expand your social life and gain a fraternal family in time of need. You will begin contact with business and social leaders (your alumni) and develop leadership and organizational skills.

From an academic standpoint, fraternity men have peer support for scholastic achievement. The G.P.A. of most fraternity men exceeds that of non-members on just about every campus. And, involvement in Fraternity will give you the opportunity to be a leader and to gain fiscal, management and leadership experience.

Tau Epsilon Phi: Our History and Principles

Founded in 1910, at Columbia University, Tau Epsilon Phi was founded on the principle of open, non-discriminatory membership. There has never been a requirement based upon a man's race, creed, color or national origin. Tau Epsilon Phi has men from all over the United States, Canada and the world; we are from a variety of backgrounds and diverse interests.

Most important, we are brothers with a collective strength. This strength comes from the belief that we all share with our Fraternity's founders . . . "To judge our fellow men not by their rank nor wealth, but by their worth as men."

Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity Services

The Tau Epsilon Phi National Fraternity offers a variety of services to our undergraduate and alumni brothers and other associates. The Fraternity's Head-quarters, located in Atlanta, Georgia is the focal point for all programs and activities related to the international organization which has active undergraduate and alumni chapters throughout the United States and Canada.

Visitations by Professional Field Staff: These visits are designed to assist our Chapters in the development of sound management, organizational and leadership programs.

Financial Guidance: The Fraternity Headquarters provides budgetary assistance, standard budget forms and guidelines for all its chapters and colonies. Also, on-campus counseling is available when a member of the Field Staff is visiting a particular group.

Insurance Program: TEP provides liability and property insurance coverage to our chapters and members in the event of a fraternity-related accident or claim.

Membership Records: The Tau Epsilon Phi Membership Management System monitored through the Fraternity Headquarters provides updated listings of

all chapters and members in a variety of formats along with mailing labels for alumni and chapter correspondence.

Publications: Along with our magazine the *PLUME*, TEP provides a wide range of materials and manuals to our undergraduate chapters and colonies on Fraternity-related issues and activities.

Conventions and Conclaves: TEP holds an International Convention (the Grand Chapter) every two years and also sponsors Regional Leadership Conclaves to unite our Chapters and to build on our common experience.

The TEP Foundation, Inc.



Scholarships and National Awards: The TEP Foundation rewards outstanding scholarship and leadership each year through a series of monetary awards.

Graduate Advisor Program: The TEP Foundation can arrange for a graduate student to live in a Chapter house and work as an advisor/counselor

for groups in need of intense and ongoing assistance.

Annual Alumni Contributions: The TEP Foundation is a tax deductible organization therefore each year many TEP alumni donate funds which, in turn, are used to better serve the educational purposes and needs of our members.

TEP Properties, Inc.

a division of the Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity:

Chapter Financial Assistance: Chapters in good standing may secure financing and loans at below market rates for improvements to existing housing or in order to purchase available fraternity housing.

Chapter Insurance Program: Chapters and colonies are able to obtain liability and property coverage at low rates through the Fraternity's Umbrella Insurance Policy.

Community Relations Program: TEP professional and volunteer staff serve as mediators between Chapters and local government or University officials in the areas of health safety, building or other code requirements.

Construction and Renovation Consultation: The Properties Division can act as a "general contractor" for any major construction or renovation program. This service ensures that bids and contracts cover exactly the scope of the work necessary. The Division can also serve as negotiators on insurance claims.

Research shows fraternity membership connects men to the university in a way nonmembers simply don't experience. They're more satisfied as students, and as alumni, are more likely to recommend and give back to their alma maters. Research shows that this connection can create a strong sense of belonging, leading members to have more positive mental health and less anxiety and depression than other students.

2. Fraternities are an accelerator for success, in college and beyond.

Fraternities capitalize on students' time outside of the classroom by preparing men for success in college and in their futures far beyond what their peers experience. Because of higher expectations, as well as the support and network fraternities provide, members experience greater gains in learning and graduate at higher rates than their peers. 83% of members say their confidence in their leadership skills increased because of their membership.

3. Fraternities create lifelong connections to the campus, community and their peers.

Fraternities empower students to create a strong support system. Members are more engaged inside and outside of the classroom than their peers—they report feeling more supported by their faculty, and nearly half serve in leadership roles across campus. They're also more connected to their local communities, with research showing they spend significantly more time volunteering than non-affiliated students.

4. Fraternity men are socially-conscious and believe in promoting safety and inclusion.

Considering high-risk behaviors including sex, alcohol and hazing, fraternity men have belief in and promote safer and more inclusive environments than nonmembers. They understand the definition of sexual assault, report drinking less and with moderation; and choose not to participate in hazing because they do not want to cause emotional harm, it goes against their values, not wanting to be legally responsible and wanting to be respected by others.

5. Fraternity men hold their peers accountable.

Research shows that fraternity men are more likely to intervene in higher-risk situations than those not affiliated and that they are more comfortable in providing accountability in the areas of academics, sexual relationships, professional/career goals, personal goals and hazing. Additionally, they cite a greater responsibility to support the personal and professional growth of their friends/peers — a proof point that affirms the meaning of true brother-hood.

2025 Expansion

This fall 2025 Tau Epsilon Phi will be recruiting to bring back our Psi chapter at the University of Illinois!

If you are an alumnus of the chapter, live near by, or know someone on the campus, we'd love to hear from you! We hope to get a minimum of 10 men who will form the class of refounding fathers and be initiated later in the fall.





After extensive efforts from the National office as well the Sigma Lambda Alumni, Tau Epsilon Phi has received the green light to return to Bryant University for the first time since the late 2000's! As Bryant has not had an expansion since 2015, our Associate Director of Growth, Jonah, will be working closely with the FSL office and interested students to make this re-founding a reality over the 2025 - 2026 academic year. TEФ's Continuing Efforts to Curb Anti-Semitism on Campuses

Anti-Semitism continues to be a problem in American society, on our college campuses, and throughout the world. As a Fraternity founded by Jewish men who were discriminated against because of their faith and heritage, it is incumbent upon us as the brothers of the fraternity they founded to uphold their legacy and facedown discrimination wherever it rears its ugly head.

In the fall 2024, I wrote an article in The Plume about Tau Epsilon Phi's efforts to protect our undergraduates on campus from antisemitic attacks and rhetoric, a year after the October 7th attack by Hamas on the Nova Music Festival, across multiple kibbutzim, and across Israel.

Today, we continue those efforts by aligning with organizations such as Hillel, the Anti-Defamation League (ADL), and others, and several of our alumni have also taken it upon themselves to form groups to reach out to colleges and undergraduate communities to offer a lending hand.

I wanted to highlight the efforts of two of those groups. Last year, Brother Adam Levine, M.D. (Epsilon Lambda 407, City College of New York) created an organization at The Ohio State University, where his son attended, to get the university to do more to protect Jewish students on campus. This year, several of our brothers who are Penn State alumni wanted to do the same thing. Brothers Mel Pirchesky, Lee Roberts, Charlie Anderson, Noah Levine, and others formed a group to see if they can contribute to making Penn State a safe place for Jewish students. In July, they started meeting with representatives of Hillel, ADL, Dr. Levine and his Ohio State group, and Tau Epsilon Phi National board members to see what more can be done.

If other alumni want to do the same – bring their chapter brothers together to work towards similar ends on their campuses, $TE\Phi$ will be happy to connect you to each other and bring contacts, information, and resources to bear for you to do so. Please don't hesitate to reach out to me at kirill.reznik@gmail.com, or our National Office.

Ongoing discussions with ADL will lead to move involvement with national and international efforts. Recently, in response to a vote by the membership of the National Education Association to disassociate from ADL, over 400 Jewish organizations signed on to a letter in protest. While other Jewish fraternities and sororities signed on to the letter, $TE\Phi$ wasn't made aware of the effort. This prompted me to call my friends at ADL to see where the disconnect was. I'm happy to report that those conversations not only led to us being added to the appropriate contact lists, but $TE\Phi$ will now be participating in ADL's annual effort to grade universities on their efforts to

fight antisemitism and protect Jewish students. You may have seen these scorecards over the last two years, and I'm proud to say that we will now be taking an active part in their development.

ADL is also revamping their materials and guides on how students should handle incidents of antisemitism and hate on campus. Once those materials are complete, $TE\Phi$ will make them available to all of our undergraduates, chapters, and alumni associations, through a link on our website.

Antisemitism is not a problem that is going away, but it cannot be ignored. Antisemitism, along with other forms of hate, including racism, homophobia, islamophobia, and many, many others, need to be met head on if we are going to pass along a more tolerant and respectable world to future generations.

I'm proud to see what Tau Epsilon Phi is doing for these efforts, and I encourage all our Brothers to join us in doing more.




Nu University of Georgia

Gamma Tau Indiana University






Rho Provisonal Chapter

How to Become a National Recognized Alumni Association?

In 2023 the Grand Council determined that any alumni association who would like to have recognition, need to complete an application and include a flat \$750 fee to include all the members of the group. The process is pretty simple and the online form to use can be found at - https://tep.org/alumni-associations/. New and first-time groups will need to be approved by the Grand Council and renewing groups just need to pay the invoice that will now be automatically generated via GreekTrack, our online member management system. We also have many alumni refer to alumni associations as alumni clubs. For your edification, the term alumni club was formerly retired during the constitutional changes approved by membership in 2018.

I am often asked what are the benefits of alumni association recognition. The current benefits are as follows:

- 1. All recognized and approved alumni associations as permitted and encouraged to send a delegate to Grand Chapter to vote on legislation and other matters that come before the Grand Chapter. This includes the biennial election of Grand Council Directors and Officers.
- 2. All recognized and approved alumni associations will be included under the national fraternity's directors and officers liability insurance. The association will still be responsible for any deductibles should a lawsuit be filed, but you will have this added layer of protection which is especially important should you have an active chapter.
- 3. All alumni association leaders and chapter advisors will have access to our online training platform through our partnership with Plaid. This is particularly valuable for those brothers who are serving as alumni advisors. It will be necessary for the alumni association to inform us who the leaders and advisors are, so we can make sure the training is available to them. The training courses available are included in the following pages.

Alumni Resource



- 1. The Role of the Advisor The Role of the advisor course covers advising basics, tactics and skills to mentor students. Additionally, the course establishes expectations of advisors as well as setting and maintaining advisor competencies.
- 2. The Interfraternal Experience The Interfraternal Experience course provides a brief history of fraternity and sorority organizations and introduces common fraternity and sorority terms. Participants will also learn about typical characteristics of Generation Z. Finally, the course discusses some common obstacles, advisors may face and their roles.
- 3. Mentoring College Students The Mentoring College Student course covers advising and mentoring today's college students. This course will also provide learners with the beneficial tools and tactics to utilize as an advisor and as a mentor to students.
- 4. Relationships The Relationships course covers the different groups that work together to support the fraternity and sorority experience. These groups include: national, regional and local entities that support fraternities and sororities. Learners will also learn about helpful resources to best advise their chapters.
- 5. Hazing Identification The Hazing Identification course discusses fraternity and sorority hazing. Participants will learn what's considered hazing, how to identify it and prevent it in the chapter, and what to do if an advisor suspects the chapter is hazing. The course also covers the advisor's role and responsibility in member safety.
- 6. Eradicating harmful behaviors The Eradicating Harmful Traditions course helps learners determine what motivates and drives the chapter and its members' decision making. Participants will also learn tactics for eradicating harmful tradition and alumni behavior.

- 7. Board Governance The Board Governance course provides learners with an overview and introduction to the basics of board governance, tactics to help members, collaborate, and preferred norms to establish efficient and effective practices.
- 8. Strategic Planning The Strategic Planning course provides learners with an overview of strategic planning, and why it's important for boards. This course prepares learners for the strategic planning process using the G. O. S. T. method through relevant examples and an explanation of responsibilities.
- 9. High Performing Board The High Performing Board course is a deep dive into Plaid's 10 Barometers to measure a successful board. This course includes a self-assessment so learners can analyze their board's performance in these ten areas.

Lastly, they have Chapter Builder that helps organize potential new members who our groups are recruiting.



Greek Track is mandatory for all undergraduates and highly encouraged for all Alumni to make accounts. TE Φ has our database of all alumni we could find on GreekTrack. We also use Greektrack to keep track of undergraduate Executive Boards, bill and collect dues, and manage email and text communications. Chapters have the ability to put in their own lineage to have a digital copy of their history, as well as create fundraising campaigns, email the active and alumni members, and create a custom web page. Any alumnus that has opted to share their work history and information becomes available for TE Φ brothers with an account to build the bridge and assist with potential internships and jobs.

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
