the Consul's Corner

I would like to start off by thanking everyone who came to the National Convention and Grand Chapter meeting in Chicago, IL this past October and elected me as the International Consul of Tau Epsilon Phi. It is a distinct honor to be chosen to lead TEΦ. We also have a great new Grand Council – a group of men that have stepped up to help guide TEΦ over the next two years. They come from a variety of professional backgrounds, representing different chapters, and different regions. Additionally, we have taken a tremendous step in professionalizing our Fraternity by hiring Brother Tim Smith, our Immediate Past Consul, as our new Executive Director.

TEΦ is growing. We currently have 13 chapters, five colonies, and a recently IFC-approved interest group at the State University of New York at Albany. It is my hope that in the next few weeks, we can add Florida State University to that list as well. Over the next two years, with the help of our professional staff, Grand Council members, and brothers who volunteer their time, we can achieve the following three very distinct goals:

- Grow our undergraduate brotherhood. The undergraduate chapters are our lifeblood. Over the next two years we will work to both grow the number of chapters and colonies at approximately two per semester, and assist the existing chapters and colonies to grow the membership in their individual chapters.
- Grow our alumni involvement. Our Fraternity has never been very good at keeping alumni involved after graduation, and that is a shame. Alumni not only provide a link for our undergraduates after college, but they help up to expand to new campuses, market our Fraternity, and provide financial support. I've asked our First Vice Consul, Mark Abramson, to lead an effort to develop our alumni outreach and help bring our alumni brothers back into active status.
- Expand our services to the brotherhood. When you are talking to prospective candidates or wooing alumni to get back involved, inevitably the same question comes up - why? Why should I join TEΦ over the house next door? Or why should I get back involved if I've been out of college for 20 years? I'm disappointed to say that our answers have never been very good. Being a part of TEΦ is special, we all know that. Our brotherhood, our values, our camaraderie. But those intangibles are hard to explain to someone on the outside looking in. It is our responsibility to make sure that members of TEΦ get tangible value for your time, your money, and your commitment. I've asked our new Executive Director to work with me to figure out what services, products, and other tangibles our undergraduates and alumni want and need.

These are lofty goals, and not something that will be "done" in a two-year term. Over the last six years we've made a lot of progress in meeting some part of these goals, and my hope is that over the next two years we make even more progress.

With that in mind, I also need something from you. As our brothers, I need you to help me grow TEΦ. I need your time, your involvement, and your commitment. Please volunteer – find a committee on the Grand Council or an alumni association to join. Be an alumni advisor or mentor to an undergraduate chapter. Knock on the door of the closest University to you and ask to help start TEΦ. We can do this, but we can only do it together.

CONVENTION 2018

Chicago Recap

This past October marked the fourth Convention and Grand Chapter meeting since Tau Epsilon Phi's restructuring in 2011. Brothers from all over the country and from each of our undergraduate groups attended and participated in both legislative, training, and leisure sessions designed to promote the fraternity and its individual members. The weekend began with a welcome reception following by dinner at the Chicago-famous Pizano's pizza. While it's worthy of the reputation it's earned in the Midwest, this writer still believes there's nothing quite like a proper New York slice.

The full legislative session took place during Friday morning and afternoon. The preparation and discussion among the undergraduates and alumni was astounding. In fact, business was conducted so efficiently that this group was able to end the session early. Major highlights include: an overwrite of the Constitution and By-Laws to reflect the way that Tau Epsilon Phi is best able to operate in the 21st century; a reduction of the Grand Council to 11 members, to mimic the way the comparable organizations operate; the installment of the Undergraduate and Alumni Advisory Committees, to supervise the work and direction of the Grand Council; and the election of the 2018-2020 Grand Council. Friday concluded with a dinner cruise along Lake Michigan, where brothers enjoyed dinner, a cash bar, and dancing with new friends made along the journey.

Saturday included training presentations from multiple brothers and associated companies. First was past Senior Vice-Consul Donald Anspauch, Jr., leading a discussion on Alcoholics Anonymous and safe drinking. Following this, Holmes Mulphy (the insurance provider for Tau Epsilon Phi Fraternity, Inc.) gave a presentation on risk management, liability, insurance, and sexual assault awareness. After the lunch break, brothers learned about the recently installed national communications and finance platforms from Memberplanet and GreekBill representatives, included walkthrough tutorials on the applications. Saturday business concluded with a review of updated national policies and a presentation by the TEP Foundation. Business adjourned, and brothers took time before the biannual Tau Epsilon Phi Awards Banquet. On the final morning, brothers participated in open-forum discussions on personally relevant topics, allowing the undergraduates to advocate for their own best interests.

During one of the breaks, this writer was able to sit down with Daniel Anderson and Vince Ferrera, the undergraduate delegates from Alpha Tau Chapter at Rowan University. The informal interview offered some insights to their experience during the weekend and opportunities for the next Grand Chapter and Convention weekend in 2020. *(continued on next page)*

Dave (W): Can the two of you give me some updates on how the weekend has been for you? What highlights or major pieces have stuck out to you?

Vince (V): I was very intimidated by the Member Planet stuff at first, and was afraid to lay a finger on it or touch it for a while. When they dropped this presentation, I was following along on my own computer and doing what they were describing. I was able to use some that knowledge to send out broadcasts to my chapter.

Daniel (D): On top of that, I had not idea how much functionality the program has to it. I'll definitely be using it a lot more now.

V: It was also interesting to be in the legislation system and felt it was really cool. Of course we've done that at the chapter level, but it was impressive to see how it's done at the national level.

W: While Grand Chapter and Convention focuses a lot on business, there's the social piece. Do either of you have some high points you'd like to share about the weekend?

V: I think a lot of the connections we've made so far are fantastic. There are several chapters within an hours drive and I hadn't even met the people running them. Seeing the like-mindedness across the board is impressive.

D: I think the events done outside the meetings are phenomenal. It's cool that I can knock hanging out on boat in the middle of a f***ing Great Lake off my bucket list, even though it wasn't really on there in the first place. This has been a really great group of guys to spend the weekend with.

W: What have your thoughts been on the operations of the event, and are there any final takeaways you can think of from this weekend?

V: I think, overall, the way National decided to run this weekend with the business and social aspects was great. I got to meet a bunch of new people with so many similarities. From the moment we got together, we've had group chats and have been following each other on social media. I'm really planning on keeping these bonds going through the upcoming semesters and years.

D: I think Grand Chapter can be even better by focusing some more effort in the alumni involvement aspect. I heard that's it's been different in the past, but it would definitely be nice to hear their stories and receive additional guidance from them. I can imagine that the upcoming Grand Council will focus on that, and I look forward to seeing what they come up with.



Remarks from Brothers Elected to Service




First Vice Consul, Mark Abramson—Mark joins the Grand Council from the EK Chapter at Tulane University, where he pledged in 1974. As an undergraduate, he held numerous executive board positions and helped the chapter in growing from fifteen to seventy-two men. Mark then attended the University of Southern California to pursue his graduate studies and support the fraternity's developing chapter there. After earning his masters degree, Mark became a financial advisor, which he continues to this day. Over the course of years, Mark has served as a chapter advisor, Member-at-Large, and chairman of the 1987 Grand Chapter meeting. Recently, he served as the president of the TEP Foundation. Mark's philanthropic efforts exist beyond the community. Mark has been active in leading and supporting his local synagogue, his children's school board, and the Central Florida Jewish Federation. Mark met his wife, Laura, through a fraternity brother of his and a sorority sister of hers. They have been happily married since 1988 and have three children: Judy, Eddie, and Max.

Second Vice Consul, Charles Wolf—Charles joins the Grand Council from the EN Chapter at Rochester Institute of Technology, where he pledged in 1974. Charles graduated in 1978 with a degree in photographic marketing management, then went to work in Manhattan's "Photo District" within his first year. In the early-1990's, Charles worked in information technical specialist with New York City law firms, around which time he met his wife, Katherine. Following a 2001 killing near his home, Charles was asked to chair a Greenwich Village business and resident neighborhood association. From there, he orchestrated the introduction of the Guardian Angels patrol group to drive out groups intimidating his community. Since the terrorist attacks of September 11th, which claimed the life of Katherine, Charles has become a major 9/11 activist, using his knowledge and skill for lobbying to help achieve many post-attack developments. As a TEP, Charles has served consecutive terms on the Grand Council as Second Vice-Consul and Member-at-Large. As an experienced parliamentarian, Charles puts this expertise to use for the fraternity. In his spare time, Charles enjoys photography, sailing, studying wine, and traveling to eat good food.



Vice Consul for Undergraduate Affairs, Chris Melbourne—Chris joins the Grand Council from the EΘ Chapter at Queens College. As an undergraduate member, he was honored by his alumni association as 2015 Undergraduate Brother of the Year and by the TEP Foundation as the 2016 Stanley Schechter Scholarship Award recipient. Chris served his chapter as chancellor during this 2015-2016 academic year, where he led the group to the chapter's highest graduating class in history. His intent was to maintain academic integrity while keeping true to the ideals of our fraternity. Chris graduated from Queens College in 2016 with a degree in biology. Chris currently works as a supervisor in a Brooklyn-based environmental company. He is the current vice chancellor of the Epsilon Theta Alumni association and past advisor to the EΘ chapter of Tau Epsilon Phi. In his free time, Chris enjoys practicing and teaching taekwondo at a local school.



Gary Lawson, Tribune—Gary joins the Grand Council from the EΘ Chapter at Queens College, where he pledged in 1963. Gary’s education led him to earn an associate in arts, followed by his J.D. from St. John’s University School of Law (1970) and his L.L.M. in taxation from the New York University School of Law (1974). During that time, he spent a semester as the graduate advisor to the TEP chapter at the Ohio State University. Over the years, Gary has practiced law over Milwaukee, Chicago, Atlanta, and Boston, eventually marrying his law school sweetheart, Marcia, who he met through TEP brothers at Queens College. Gary lives with Marcia -north of Dallas, Texas, where he continues to practice law and tour in a privately-owned coach bus with his wife, his TEP brothers, and their sweethearts. In time, Gary has authored several dozens of legal articles and has founded and/or served on the Boards for several non-for-profit agencies.

Donald Anspauch, Jr., Member-At-Large—Donald joins the Grand Council from the EΦ Chapter at Penn State University, where he pledged in 1975. During his undergraduate career, he served as rush chairman and scribe. Following his graduation, he received the honor of being elected as president of the Penn State Alumni Association. Nationally, he has served as regional governor for Southern California and on the Grand Council as Member-at-Large, then Senior Vice Consul. Donald reactivated the TEP Foundation in 2011 and served as president for several years. His current focus is on alumni relations and communication. In his professional life, Donald is a tax accountant in solo practice, focusing on the entertainment industry in West Hollywood, California.



Dr. Lawrence Goodstein, Member-At-Large—Lawrence joins the Grand Council from the EP Chapter at Brooklyn College, where he pledged in 1974. During his time there, he served as pledge educator, vice chancellor, and alumni advisor. He later attended Adelphi University, where he helped establish a chapter there in the 1980’s. Following college, Lawrence worked for the New York City Department of Education before eventually earning his degree in chiropractic medicine. Since then, Lawrence has practiced in Massachusetts and Rhode Island, lectured at many universities, and authored a book on chiropractic medicine. Following the tragedy of September 11th, Lawrence temporarily left his practice to offer volunteer services to the rescue and recovery workers there. In his free time, Lawrence enjoys spending time with family, playing cards and reading books.

Matthew Johnson, Member-At-Large—Matt joins the Grand Council from the EI Chapter at Rensselaer, where he pledged in 2013. As a brother, he served on the executive board as historian, vice chancellor, and chancellor. In addition to this, he spent three years managing the chapter’s recruitment, helping the group to define the way they manage their marketing toward potential new TEPs. Matt graduated with a degree in business management and immediately took a role on the Epsilon Iota Alumni Association’s board as social chair. Matt intends on using his youth and eagerness to help bridge the gaps between undergraduates and the Grand Council. Professionally, Matt is working toward earning his electrical journeyman’s license while volunteering his marketing expertise to Boston-area non-for-profit agencies.


