The Consul's Corner

Spring is always a time for renewal, and as we enter the Spring semester of 2020, we want to both look back at all we have accomplished and look ahead to what is still in store for our fraternity. For those undergraduate brothers who are graduating this semester, we hope that your college years as part of Tau Epsilon Phi have been memorable, and that you take with you not just lifelong friendships, but a sense of purpose for your future, instilled in you by your brotherhood. For those returning brothers, I hope that you face the remainder of your college career with dedication, academic vigor, and a commitment to making you chapter better than how you found it. For alumni, now is as good a time as ever to reflect on how you can give back to your fraternity by donating your time, your talent, or your treasures to help grow and advance our brotherhood.

The Spring 2020 semester brings us to our 21st campus at the University of Maine at Orono. Originally founded in 1929, the Tau Zeta chapter at the University of Maine was brought back through the hard work and advocacy of two dedicated alumni, Douglas Thornton and Leonard Minsky. Once the re-founding class is initiated it will be our northern most campus.

In addition to the University of Maine we've successfully secured several other campus returns. We are finalizing details to return to the University of Florida (Tau Alpha) this coming Fall 2020, and have commitments to return to the University of Delaware (Phi Psi) in Fall 2021, and Towson University (Tau Sigma Upsilon) in Fall of 2023. Some of these dates seem far away, but having these commitments helps us to establish a pipeline for guaranteed growth in the future.

We are also excited about our future expansion. We are actively talking to multiple campuses in New York, New Jersey, and Florida, and beginning to look at campuses in Pennsylvania, New Hampshire, and other states. The number one question I get from alumni when we announce a new expansion is "What about my campus?" We would love to get back to your campus if possible, but we need your help to do that. Is your son, grandson, nephew, brother, friend, or neighbor heading to college this Fall? Encourage them to pledge Tau Epsilon Phi, and if there isn't already a chapter or colony on campus, encourage them to start one.

It is better organized and has a number of new features, including Chapter and Alumni resources, a new and improved TEF Store, and a lot of other great information. Over the next few months we will be developing individual landing pages for each chapter and colony, and will begin to actively advertise the TE Φ Job Board to help graduating undergrads and alumni find professional opportunities.

Finally, I wanted to remind everyone that Grand Chapter 2020 is planned for October at Great Wolf Lodge in Charlotte, North Carolina. Please look for more information in this issue of The Plume, as well as on our website and social media pages for additional information.

I am grateful for our brotherhood, and look forward to 2020 being the best year yet for friendship, chivalry, and service of our fraternity.

SITE FLOW




Tau Zeta, University of Maine, Orono, Maine

Spotlighting our connection back to UMaine in preparation of our return to campus.

With the eminent return of our Tau Zeta group at the University of Maine this spring, the Grand Council wanted to shine a spotlight on the connection that spring-boarded such progress:

Brother Leonard Minsky, TZ Class of 1950. I was lucky enough to speak with "Len" about his time with the fraternity, his professional career, and extensive connections to UMaine, Jewish community in the Maine area, and his extensive work around the state of Maine.

COLLEGIATE YEARS

Len attended UMaine from 1946-1950, graduating with a B.S. in Business Administration. He joined the fraternity in his time as an undergrad, serving as social chair and fundraising chair, both assisting the chapter to buying a house after Len's graduation. Len's involvement would only continue as an advisor to the chapter, and he would even later serve on a committee with 3 other TZ members to raise funds for and organize an expansion to the living wing of the house. In our conversation, Len loved his time as an undergrad, but "those years as an advisor, passing down knowledge and watching young boys grow into fine men under my wing, those were the best." Len even traveled to the Tau Iota chapter at Dalhousie University in Halifax, Nova Scotia as a representative for national. Not only a true leader to his chapter, Len would go on to lead all through his professional career.

PROFESSIONAL SUCCESS

After college and some time with the fraternity as an advisor, Len met and married his beloved wife Renee, pictured together top right. He then founded Superior Paper Products Inc, a paper packaging and merchandising company that he was the President of for the majority of his career. On top of his own organization, Len served on various different Boards for both local decision making and corporate avenues, such as the Board Chairman



for the Maine State Chamber of Commerce, Chair & Founder of the Bangor Foreign Policy Forum, Chair of the Jewish Community Council, and so many more. Len's reach truly knew no bounds, as he was

able to touch many parts of the Bangor community with his work. And when he and Renee decided it was time to hang up the briefcases, the work didn't stop there.

SUPPORT FOR THE ARTS AND OTHERS

Len and Renee have always held the arts close to their hearts. After their success in the community, they decided to give back. Not only did they establish multiple fundraisers and endowments for the University of Maine, its arts departments (particularly spearheading the visual arts department), and the Maine arts community as a whole, the Minsky's have also served as Chairs to the Maine Patrons of the Arts for the last 35 years. From sponsoring local art installations and shows to gifted naming rights of the Minsky Recital Hall on UMaine's campus, the Minsky name has changed Maine's arts forever. The University sure agrees, too, having awarded Len and Renee with various awards, including both the Stillwater Award (UMaine's highest ranking award) and the Hartgen Award for impact to the Arts department. Len even holds an honorary degree from the University of Maine.

I read an article prior to speaking with Len I felt really drove home how amazing a man he is, even down to the little things, and especially in regards to our ideals. His foreign policy forum and Jewish outreach group helped bring 14 Chinese families to Bangor to help them start a new life. Len gave one of the gentlemen, who didn't know English, his very first job. 40 years later, that man's kids threw Len and his forum members a party to thank them for the chances their efforts allowed them (pictured below). I couldn't help but think that was karma screaming at us that chivalry and service are not forgotten. For those lessons and all of your work, thank you Len.



Executive Director Update

This past summer and fall semester were a busy time for Tau Epsilon Phi. In addition to the hiring of two new staff members we attended many industry conventions / conferences. Those included the annual meeting of the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) where I was again honored and humbled by our inter-fraternal colleagues to be elected to serve a second term on the NIC governing council. I was also able to attend training put on by the Fraternity Executives Association (FEA) regarding mental health. Additionally, I attended risk management training that was put on by the HART Institute for social planning and sponsored by our insurance provider, Holmes Murphy. As a member of the NIC governing council, I was invited to attend for the first time the annual Student Affairs Administrators in Higher Education (NASPA) Annual meeting. This conference (different in style from most) gave us an opportunity to work with senior administers in education to help address issues facing many campus and Greek life organizations utilizing a round table discussion format. Each table was chosen so that no one at a table was working with anyone they had previously known. This created a blank slate allowing everyone to have open and honest conversations about whatever topic was being discussed. As the day went on, the

groups would come back together as a whole and report out their findings. While we are certainly early on in these discussions, I remain cautiously optimistic about coming together to find solutions that would benefit both sides of the isle. Lastly to wrap up the year, I attended the annual Fraternal Law Conference with Second Vice Consul Wolf, and then represented the fraternity at the annual meeting of the Association for Fraternity Advisors (AFA).

In addition to the various conferences and conventions we attended, I personally traveled to several chapters that were having issues with internal operations, finances, or even challenges with their University. Many of those issues have since been resolved, and for those still ongoing, I continue to provide support and guidance with the hope of a speedy resolution.

It has been brought to my attention that there is a rumor going around that TEP no longer supports BBYO's International Convention (IC.) For those not in the know, TEP National has participated in this annual event since we reorganized the fraternity back in 2012. I want to assure everyone that is NOT the case. Not only have we as an organization affirmed our commitment to BBYO IC, we have committed to being a multi-year gold sponsor for this event. Alumnus Brother Josh Frieser from our Gamma Tau Chapter at Indiana University has agreed to chair this event and we have come up with some unique ideas to help drive focus not only to our booth, but to engage the members of BBYO in the benefits of joining a collegiate fraternity. We are excited for the publicity and potential opportunities this may have with recruitment especially at our historically Jewish chapters.

Lastly, I want to thank all those Brothers who have reached out and shared their comments and support on the efforts we have made to grow and promote TEP. We have come so far since taking our organization back in 2011 and we have some great plans to continue to expand our organization at campuses for the coming years. I hope you share with me the hope for the future as it truly is bright. Please don't hesitate to reach out if I can be of assistance.
