
The Consul's Corner

We want to see alumni engagement increase and we are working towards finding new ways to meet our goal. The first steps for us is to connect you with your chapter and find ways to help the ones to come.







The official mascot of Tau Epsilon Phi, the Knight is the representation of our three pillars of friendship, chivalry, and service. The mascot has certain key elements on it that align with our brand imagery taken from our crest. In conjunction with our partners at Affinity Marketing and with input from multiple focus groups from our chapters at Rutgers Camden, RPI, Rowan, Buffalo, Indiana, and Maryland, we are able to present you this form of our new mascot recently approved by the Grand Council.

The Tau Epsilon Phi knight, holds his sword with emeralds and pearls around the hilt. $TE\Phi$ is engraved on the bottom of his blade to distinguish the knight with our letters. He holds a heart chained up with the links and its gauntlets brandishing the stars. These elements are found within the mystics of our fraternity and the meaning behind those elements pair to be true to the precepts of knighthood. Humble but proud, the knight stands to represent our fraternities' principals and demonstrate our strong brotherhood.



The Bridge Builder



The Bridge Builder article is meant to highlight alumni accomplishments in personal, professional or fraternal excellence.

Al Versacci has been a TEP Brother for over 59 years, initiated in 1962 by the Epsilon Mu Chapter at Hunter College, City University of New York. He served two terms as chapter Chancellor and was awarded by his chapter brothers the Meritorious Service Award for his faithful service. He worked with long term Executive Secretary, Sid Suntag, affectionately called the "The Bald Eagle" as the National Assistant Executive Secretary. Al continued to serve on the Grand Council for over twenty-two years becoming the youngest brother to be elected Consul in 1981. He served as Consul from 1981-1983 and then as a three (3) term president of The TEP Foundation, Inc. from 1983-1989. During his tenure, among his many accomplishments, he is most proud of, with the help of many alumni, the publishing of "The History of Tau Epsilon Phi, 75 Years of Friendship, 1910 – 1985." by Sidney S. Suntag. We are overjoyed to have had the opportunity to interview Brother Al Versacci about his Tau Epsilon Phi career and announce him as this articles Bridge Builder.

Brother Versacci has many accomplishments and fond memories during his time as an undergraduate. He loved living in the fraternity house at Hunter College with his brothers. One of his favorite memories was working with Sidney S. Suntag to secure a chapter house. At the time they were a chapter of around twenty (20) members and were renting loft quarters. Since most members were commuter students, they were missing a central location to really stick to. Al went directly to the national headquarters to speak to Executive Secretary Sidney Suntag who would not give them any aid on getting the house without certain guidelines being met. Brother Suntag was skeptical; however, Al and his chapter brothers were able to meet his guidelines and recruit enough members to go to 70 concurrent members. Brother Suntag was impressed that Epsilon Mu could pull off such an effort and kept his promise. Al could not have been more prideful of his chapter brothers and I am sure they were proud of Al's dedication.

Sidney S. Suntag and Al Versacci were extremely close throughout their time together. Al mentioned the first time he met Sidney during our talk. Al first spoke to him was when he arrived at the national office, which at the time was located above a pizza parlor on 42nd street in times square. He went to the office to get Tau Epsilon Phi history cards to use for his awards ceremony. Al mentioned how nervous he was meeting Sidney since he was such a distinguished brother and knowing he was a Major in the army. The two got along nicely and had a pleasant talk before he got his history cards. This was just the start of their mark on TEP's history working together for the fraternity.

After his undergraduate years with his chapter brothers, Al moved onto national efforts and further education. He attended the University of Southern California for educational purposes and TEP National offered Al a scholarship to be the newly created Graduate Resident Advisor to the reactivated Tau Gamma Chapter. With Al's encouragement the chapter brothers worked very hard and were successful with a strong comeback on the USC campus. To this day, Al still connects to brothers he met during his tenure there. Those brothers visit Al in New York from time to time, bridging his connections over many years.

Al mentioned that he doesn't know how to explain this kind of experience and brotherhood to non-Greeks other than by sharing his own experience. Being open to those who share the memories of their experiences through TEP can shed light on what it means to not only be a Greek life member but a brother of Tau Epsilon Phi. Fraternal brotherhood goes farther than anyone expects or sees at first glance. Al Versacci is a prime example of this fraternalism. Our brothers Al Versacci and Sidney Suntag had experienced and gave this fraternalism to all brothers of Tau Epsilon Phi but what made them both bridgebuilders is what they did for one another. Sadly, after Sidney's passing and complications within his family, his granddaughter Shanna had no family to go to. Al went above and beyond to his brothers wishes in helping his granddaughter. Al and his late wife Louis (Levine) Versacci fought for and won legal custody of Shanna from the state of Georgia to join their family when she was a child and raised her to the distinguished woman she is today. Brother Versacci is a true Bridge Builder and a one-of-a-kind generational Tau Epsilon Phi brother. The more you put into TEP the more you get out of it, that phrase speaks kindly to many brothers this fraternity has raised. Al put his all into this fraternity to this day continuing his efforts with the TEP foundation.

Al was asked if you had three (3) things you wanted TEP to do for the future what would they be and why. Al responded by saying, for all of our chapters to be strong and really love the ideals of our fraternity, as corny as that sounds, I think they are what makes this so important. To foster bonds and relationships with one another. I have friends from 1965 that we've been to weddings and still meet up. I have brothers from California and Virginia who drive hours to just stay in New York and reconnect. I want to see the brothers focus on its brotherhood more than anything. Our diversity is the wealth of our brotherhood and adds so much to our value as an organization. Today being a college student is very difficult from the rigors of society. It was difficult back then and now we need to provide more moral support, being an encourager, listening and giving advice. Above all don't let your brothers be treated badly or be hazed. When I asked Al about the founders, he told me how he met Israel "Doc" Schwartz and had to talk to him about a loan for a down payment for a fraternity house. One memory that resonated with him was when founding brother Schwartz reached out to Al to help him write the obituary for his founding pledge brother Julius M. Brietenbach. He was a very sweet man and well revered in the New York Community especially for TEP's. The founders stayed with TEP after graduating, participating in full activities and volunteer work through World War I and II. When asked about the future that he would want to see for Tau Epsilon Phi, Al spoke from his heart and his excitement for it. The future that I want to see is a better understanding for each member of Tau Epsilon Phi. I am excited to have the TEP foundation and the national fraternity working towards the future of the fraternity and brotherhood.

Al currently lives in the Bronx, NY and has a family of three daughters, Jennifer, Marguerite and Sarah (with a special addition to the family, Shanna, Sid Suntag's granddaughter) and two sons-in-law David Lewitt and Chris Keppler along with five grandchildren, Ethan, Louis, Isabela, Sophie and Charley. Shanna taught Al's grandson Ethan how to swim when he was three and now at the age of 15 she is certifying him to be a lifeguard. Shanna is a true bridge builder! Al is survived by his late beloved wife Lois (Levine) Versacci, Esq. after 27 years of marriage. Al also survived the late Sandra Katz, Esq. his be-

loved partner of twenty years.

Executive Director

In the immortal words of Gerry Garcia "what a long strange trip it's been." As has been said many times already, this past year was one no one could have predicted nor planned for. We had to learn on the fly and pivot to keep our fraternity going. I'm so happy to say now that the 2020 – 2021 school year is over, we did it! Not only did we survive this past year, we actually saw an increase in our numbers year-over-year, something that many other national fraternities were unable to do. We actually saw a 3.3% increase in candidates across the board, while over 66% of other NIC national fraternities saw a decrease in candidates with the majority of those (20.8%) seeing a decrease of 11-20% in membership. This was no small effort and I want to thank all our chapters and colonies for everything they did to make it happen. We partnered early in the pandemic with Phired Up to provide virtual education related to how best to rush and recruit virtually and be successful at it. We knew from research that those students coming to college for the first time during the pandemic were desirous of making connections and being a part of a college experience. Joining a fraternity filled that role even when you couldn't be together in person. We are excited to say that we have renewed this partnership for the upcoming school year and we hope our members continue to embrace this important training and resources. Our staff has had to work remotely during this time and did a phenomenal job doing so while continuing to provide support to all our chapters and colonies. It was great to have the team back together in person for the first time this past May since not being able to see them in person nor travel since March 2020.

Like every other organization, the North American Interfraternity Conference (NIC) also had to pivot and the governing council (board of directors) which I have the honor to serve on, did just that. We went from meeting in person to meeting exclusively over Zoom. This allowed us to actually meet more often and somewhat more efficiently. I know our chairman would always be shocked when we burned thru an agenda in record time. Earlier in June, I'm happy to report we have now returned to meeting in person and it was so great to see our inter-fraternal colleagues in person and have that much needed interaction. This unique group of men and woman who serve as fraternity executives know better than anyone what we went through and it was nice to be able to celebrate as well as commiserate together after the end of this past year. I'm also happy to announce that some very exciting research has been going on during this difficult time. We aren't quite ready to release it, but we expect it to be available in advance of this coming fall semester. It is not only quantitative but is also qualitative in demonstrating the tangible benefits of belonging to a fraternity. There are many things that we all know firsthand from our personal experiences in this research, but now we have outside facts to prove it.

Now that we are slowly but surely returning to some sense of normalcy, I am hopeful that our chapters and colonies will have as normal an experience as possible this coming school year. At present 14 of our 19 groups are required to be vaccinated by the start of the fall semester and this number may even increase as we get closer to the fall. Typically, we would host our summer leadership retreat / academy during the summer but we made a decision earlier in the year to postpone it due to the unpredictability of meeting in person. Instead, we will be hosting some virtual training / educational programs in what we have called our summer seminar series. These virtual meetings will cover topics related to mental health, diversity, equity and inclusion, understanding and creating your chapter identity on campus including how best to rush and recruit and finally hazing awareness, prevention and overall risk management. I am also excited to say we are currently finalizing plans to have our popular leadership retreat return during the fall semester and once details are finalized they will be shared with all our undergraduate members. I know everyone is excited to be back in person and I look forward to seeing our Brothers at this popular event.

Finally, I want to thank the entire team as well as the Grand Council for their continued support and guidance. I am so happy to see us return to some sense of normalcy and I hope you and your families are all doing well. If we can be of service to you, please don't hesitate to let any of us at national know. We are always happy to help where we can.

The knight had popped up before in multiple chapters social media or in general pictures throughout the years as something they created for their own purposes. The crest of course is our ultimate symbol of Tau Epsilon Phi pride, there is no doubt in that. However, as we look at our constituents in the NIC we saw a need we were not meeting. In conjunction with numerous chapters, alumni, staff and with the Grand Council's approval, we now have the first official mascot of Tau Epsilon Phi. Our intent is to not only bring into the fold an additional symbol of our pillars but to take notice in the knight on our crest and its usage throughout our own history as a symbol that coincides with the mystics of Tau Epsilon Phi.

Associate Director of Chapter Services

This past year of isolation and working from my box of a room, not being able to travel for work or personal reasons, I had plenty of time to reflect on my work. My goal was to find any resources that our students needed to help steer the waters of this uncertain future. We needed to fulfill this clear need for trainings and digital recruitment resources. As many of you know we have had our partnership with PhiredUp and their digital recruitment tools since the beginning of the pandemic. During the middle of the pandemic, Tim Smith our Executive Director, further connected us to a variety of trainings from the NIC to aid our groups and educate them on new strategies.

Working with chapters virtually during the pandemic has been a whole new experience I don't think anything could have prepared me for. The book of virtual engagement and chapter visits doesn't exist and all national organizations and educational vendors scrambled to find best practices. We engaged our partners and constituents at a national level to find new avenues to best serve our groups during this past year. We virtually engaged chapter executive boards to keep up to date with their situations and give aid when able. This aid came in the form of workshops, trainings, and meetings with chapter executive boards to discuss ways the chapter can take to engage membership and potential new members. Recruitment was definitely the most difficult topic to discuss with each campuses different policies. Chapters that never used social media before had to adopt digital advertising and those who were tech savvy created community discords; some even used paid advertising to market virtual information tables and events.

If you haven't heard of our digital composite effort yet well here we go again. There will also be an article within this plume addressing the need for more articles so if we haven't said it enough let us know if you have something to share with our membership. In all seriousness though, seeing our history has become easily on of my favorite projects. Making these historical items accessible to our greater membership and holding historical composites in my hands has been a pure joy. I always look to find projects, that I feel are a missing piece to what we should have, that can be shared with our membership. The number of brothers submitting photos and composites each month has increased steadily and I hope to continue to share these moments in history with you. Currently I tasked myself with reading the entire, *The History of Tau Epsilon Phi 75 Years of Friendship*, 1910-1985, that was written by Sidney S. Suntag and aided by Al Versacci who's help was instrumental to publishing this book. From my generation's perspective, seeing our history is not only fun to read but enjoyable to get a glimpse into the ventures of Tau Epsilon Phi since its inception. This book has educated me on some topics that I have used to better myself at my job. Information in this book has helped us put together facts in our expansion packets and has shed light on old solid fraternity practices we added to our work ethic. This book and our chapter services archives inspired me to reshape our chapter accreditation packets for this fall to better communicate our chapters/colonies efforts to advisors, future chapter executive boards and the Grand Council. I am enthusiastic for this falls chapter services, I will be back on the road doing the work I love with new and old brothers. My first stops will be to Clarkson and Johnson & Wales as I was on my way to them right before the pandemic started and need to get back out there to them. See you soon Brothers!




Clarkson University Lambda Phi Epsilon Chapter



University of Florida Tau Alpha Colony



There was also our annual Greek week where all of Greek life competes while raising money for two deserving charities: Amputee Blade Runners and Steps of Faith Foundation. Both organizations provide prosthetics free of charge to patients who have experienced limb loss and do not have the financial coverage to receive prosthetic limbs. Our colony raised over \$2,000 despite being heavily impacted financially by the pandemic. We also placed 5th overall with 10 competing teams within Greek life. In terms of awards, president Adam Weiner was given the Order of Omega Scholar of the Year award. This award is given to somebody with a 3.5 GPA or higher as well as containing leadership qualities. Senior Conrad Williams also ended his term on the Interfraternity Council as mental health chair. We will be looking forward to having somebody in our colony represent IFC in the 2021-2022 school year.

Last but not least, the Tau Omega colony at URI is pleased to announce its opportunity to be chartered and recognized as a chapter! This has been a long-term goal of ours and we are beyond thankful for having the national council notice our progress this summer. All in all, the COVID-19 pandemic had a great impact on everyday life. But the Tau Omega colony had defied the odds countless times and are super excited to enter the next school year being almost fully in-person.

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



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
