
The Consul's Corner




Vice-Consul of Undergraduate Affairs Matthew Tursi

With the boards approval, we have put into place effective employee benefit plans for health care coverage, retirement and business related expense reimbursement. serving on the Grand Council this fall.









New Research Proves The Value of Fraternities!

We all know the positive impact that Tau Epsilon Phi has had on our lives. From lifelong friendships to professional preparedness and from developing us as leaders to fostering a mindset for service, our brotherhood helped make us who we are today.

We know that. But recent research on fraternities has actually proven the impact that Tau Epsilon Phi and fraternities have on men in college and throughout their lives.



Research proves that fraternities foster positive mental health, serve as an accelerator for success, and engender tremendous loyalty and connection to their campus, community and brothers.

Here are three key takeaways from a collection of independent studies on fraternities.

1. Fraternity members experience stronger mental health and wellness.

While college men are experiencing loneliness and depression at increasing rates, fraternities empower students to create a strong support system.

Research shows that this connection can create a strong sense of belonging, leading members to have more positive mental health and less anxiety and depression than other students. Brothers feel comfortable having tough conversations and learning from each other, and when they seek help, members are twice as likely to reach out to a fraternity brother than anyone else.

2. Fraternities are an accelerator for success, in college and beyond.

Students spend 90% of their time outside the classroom. Fraternities capitalize on those hours by preparing men for success in college and in their futures far beyond what their peers experience. A study of thousands of alumni of diverse backgrounds shows this holds true regardless of an individual's background or socioeconomic status entering college.


Because of higher expectations, as well as the support and network fraternities provide, members experience greater gains in learning and graduate at higher rates than their peers. 83% of members say their confidence in their leadership skills increased because of their membership. Fraternity members also report higher levels of interaction with people different from themselves, lending them being more prepared than their peers to join a diverse workforce and community.

3. Fraternities create lifelong connection to the campus, community and their peers.

Fraternity men love their collegiate experience – as students and as alumni. In fact, more than 8 out of 10 fraternity members say they would rejoin their organizations. Research shows fraternity membership connects men to the university in a way that non-members simply don't experience. They're more satisfied as students and as alumni are more likely to recommend and give back to their alma maters.

Members are more engaged inside and outside of the classroom than their peers—they report feeling more supported by their faculty, and nearly half serve in leadership roles across campus. They're also more connected to their local communities, with research showing they spend significantly more time volunteering than non-affiliated students.




Many of our members have served in accordance to our creed and hold true to the ideals of our founders. One such brother and past Consul is Gerald Denmark, Phi Lambda #199.

Brother Denmark was initiated in the fall of 1966 during the tenure of past Consul Mendel Room Jr. and our Executive Secretary Sidney S. Suntag. He matriculated at Long Island University for two (2) years, serving as Scribe of the chapter before transferring schools to Hofstra University. At the time, a local fraternity at Hofstra, Sigma Alpha Sigma, was in the process of joining the ranks of Tau Epsilon Phi's chapter roll. The Sigma Alpha Sigma colony was first forming as brother Denmark was transferring to the college. As the colony was expanding, he was fortunate to serve as the chapter's recruitment chair. Helping the new executive board recruit like minded individuals who represent TEP values.

In 1969, he was also elected at convention to serve as a member of the first group of undergraduates on the Grand Council. While enrolled at Brooklyn Law School, brother Denmark was employed part time as a field secretary for Sidney S. Suntag. During his weekends, brother Denmark would travel to help with new expansion efforts. He went on to serve in variable capacities on the Grand Council until the early 2000's when he transitioned out. Brother Denmark served the national fraternity around 40 years in total.

One highlight from his fraternal career he is most fond of was his service as Consul from 1985-1989. During this time the fraternity was going through an age of rapid growth. At the time the fraternity had chapters all over the east coast, mid west and California. During his term as Consul, the TEP Foundation published Sid Suntag's 75 Years of *Friendship.* "Sid had a memory like a steel trap when it came to names and dates, he was an important figure in so many lives" said brother Denmark. He recollected that past Executive Director Jonathan Seidel was the first to pick up a copy of the book from the first shipment by the publisher and Sidney signed the book for him. His time with TEP national as Consul was full of amazing memories and shared with incredible members that were household names. Meeting and working with members such as brother Samuel Lefrak, Governor Marvin Mandel, Harris Jacobs, Sidney S. Suntag, Al Versacci and others too numerous to mention here. After four (4) years as Consul, brother Denmark transitioned to the President of the TEP Foundation in 1989, taking over for Al Versacci.

Brother Denmark spoke about his friendships with past Consuls Al Versacci, Bud Schiff, Stu Blumberg, Leo Gordan, David Steinberg, and former Executive Directors Mike Ivers, and Jonathan Seidel. They talk every two (2) weeks over zoom or in-person when able to reconnect," it is a very fun and joyous meeting" said brother Denmark.

I asked brother Denmark what he would like to see from our organization for the future. "I'd like to see national re-establish many of the chapters that were at major universities and small colleges where we have a great alumni base". He loved seeing that the fraternity was expanding back to campuses such as Psi chapter at the University of Illinois. He spoke about returning to our international status, hopefully returning to Canada one day and working hard to strengthen and grow the foundation of which he is a trustee.

Brother Denmark was an attorney in private practice and in-house general counsel to a regional corporation. He retired from his career at the age of 60, and is now turning 75. His focus during his professional career as a lawyer was conducting corporate and business transactions. One brother that had a massive influence on brother Denmark was Stan Schachter. Stan was from Alpha chapter and an attorney in New York City. He was a member of the pledge class that Denmark spoke of as one of the greatest classes in our history. He was the historian for Alpha chapter and kept in great communication with many Alpha alumni until his death a few years ago. Stan was a Vice-Consul of the fraternity, and a prime advisor to Sidney S. Suntag for decades. "Many of us would call him for some advice, as did many other attorneys and judges within TEP," said brother Denmark.


Happy Summer Brothers! I hope you are all finding time to spend with friends and family and enjoy the warm weather that summer brings. If you are anything like me, I've had a pent-up demand to travel from all the COVID related restrictions that have been in place for the past few years. I'm looking forward to taking some well-deserved vacation later this month, and I hope you all are able to get away and spend time in a new or favorite location of yours. This past semester has been very positive for Tau Epsilon Phi. We have seen a general lifting of most if not all COVID related restrictions and campus life has mostly returned to pre-pandemic levels. Our chapters and colonies have been doing very well. Overall, our year-over-year membership returning in the spring semester was up 15.4%, and our candidate recruitment was up 30.6% with 26.9% of those starting the candidate program ultimately becoming Brothers. We are very pleased with these statistics and happy to report that we ended the academic year with 713 active members, our second highest semester since we began tracking this data starting back in 2015. We are optimistic that this coming year will set a new record high for membership since taking our fraternity back over in 2011.

We are so excited for our upcoming IN PERSON Convention and Grand Chapter scheduled for Oct 6-9, 2022 in beautiful Baltimore, Maryland! Plans are still being put together for programming, but we are aiming for a mix of educational sessions, necessary legislative updates, grand council elections as well as some fun activities and free time to spend with your Brothers from around the country. Registration is open and all details regarding the event can be found on our website at - www.tep.org/grandchapter. I encourage you all to register and come on out and learn what's going on with your fraternity and spend time with Brothers from around the country.

We have a very busy fall semester planned as well. We have expansion opportunities for our return to The Ohio State University, as well as continuing to build upon the refounding fathers' class at Binghamton University. We are also hopeful, with the pandemic restrictions lifted at the City College of New York, we will be able to get a new candidate class there for our third expansion this fall semester. I'm sure our Associate Director of Expansion Jake Corter will share with you the details on our successful return to the University of Delaware, where I was among several brothers who had the honor and privilege of being part of their initiating team this past May.

Additionally, we are always looking for things we can do to help out and support our alumni! I'm excited to report on the reformation of the Tau Omega Alumni Association from the University of Rhode Island. Thank you to Brother Brian Resnevic for stepping up and leading the way. I'm looking forward to seeing your success and helping one of our newest chapters continue to grow. 


